COX AS PACIFIST

Claim Will Be Made He Lost Alien Vote in Last Campaign for Governor.

BETRAYAL REAL REASON

Democratic Nominee Replies to Harding Statement, but Avoids League.

By a Staff Correspondent of THE SUN AND NEW YORK HERALD. COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 14.—The position of Gov. Cox in regard to the pacifist and pro-German editorials appearing in his own newspaper, the Dayton News, during the period just prior to the entry of the United States into the war, when Germany committed a long series of outrages against American honor, will be defended during the campaign by certain Democratic publications which themselves took an exactly opposite stand through that critical period of disturbance.

Campaign Affected by Flu.

It developed to-day that the campaign of 1916, the result of which is being held up as an indication of public feeling, in this section of the country at least, was seriously handicapped by the nationwide influenza epidemic of that year. Even Francis B. Willis, Cox's opponent, was stricken with the disease and was compelled to abandon his speaking trip. Public meetings in many cities were under the ban, and many voters were so afraid of falling victim to the epidemic that they remained away from the polls.
