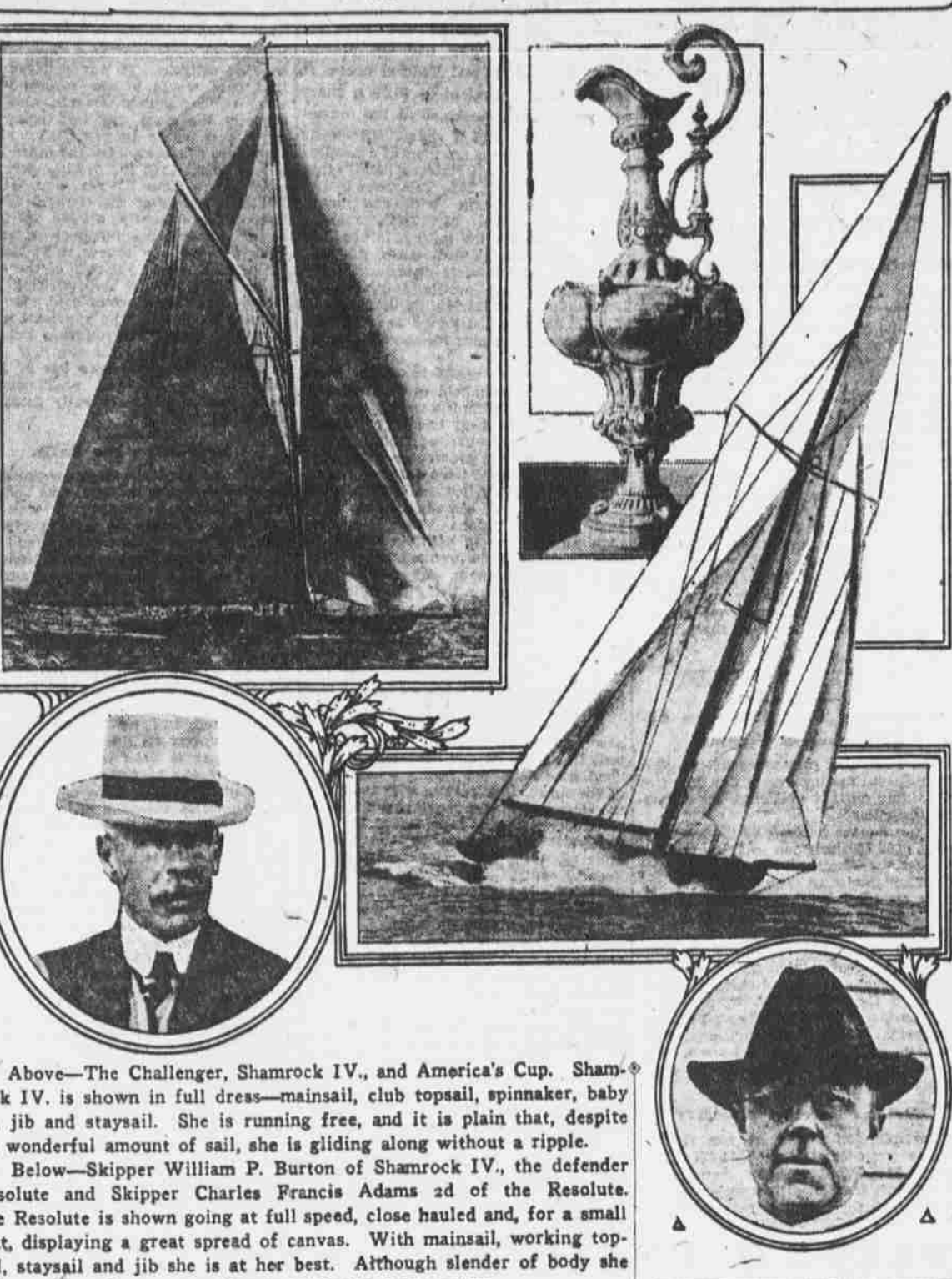

The reason for the handicap in favor of the American boat is that Shamrock IV. carries approximately 1,800 square feet more canvas than her rival, which gives her a decided advantage in a boat for boat comparison. The time was when America's defence of the trophy meant not only the biggest sporting proposition in the world, but a test of its supremacy in designing and building the fastest craft and in handling them to the best advantage.

America's Yachting Success Stands Without Parallel. The America's Cup competition is a most singular affair in many respects. For one thing the Cup is the oldest sporting trophy of any account. For another thing the competition is the only one in which one nation has been able to maintain its supremacy without a single lapse.

Question of Time Allowance Not an Agreeable One. This question of time allowances develops the one disagreeable phase of the international races. As the challenger has the greater sail area it is taken for granted that she will have the greater driving power. Accordingly it has been determined that the Resolute's seven minutes one second over the thirty mile course.
