Items of Interest Gathered From the Columns of Our Exchanges.

A letter received in this city yesterday from Congressman Roberts in Washington states that he, with his family, are comfortably located in the capital city and that all are enjoying themselves with all the pleasure that the intense heat will allow. During the extreme hot spell, Mr. Roberts witnessed prostrations daily on going to and from his office and people could always count on seeing horses stretched out along the avenue overcome by the heat.

He believes that there is a possibility of congress adjourning early in August for the summer resting spell. President Taft is becoming stronger every day and that is conceded by all parties in Washington official circles. Taft will have little, if any, opposition for the nomination and will undoubtedly be re-elected president.

Reno Papers Have Evidently Made Serious Mistakes
The Reno papers continue to get things on the wrong trail. They have been announcing that Lawrence, the former postmaster of Hazen, who is serving a life sentence for murder, has been pardoned. He is in the pen and made no application the present term. The man who is out is J. W. Carroll, who was paroled at a meeting a year ago. He has finished his entire sentence and is making a good citizen as he has been in business for nearly a year.

Lawrence, on the other hand, has made two applications which were turned down. He was found guilty of murdering a man at the time Hazen was considered the toughest town in the state. He enticed a man into the sand dunes and killed him for the money he had on his person.

Dangberg Company Has Rented Big Range

The Dangberg company has rented the range formerly used by Tom Rickey at the head of Carson river. This is considered one of the finest summer ranges in the entire west. The Truckee River General Electric company purchased the holdings from Rickey a number of years ago and has been leasing it to sheepmen. The moving of cattle into the section will shut out many sheep that have been accustomed to making headquarters up that direction. There is considerable government land in the same section which the forest service lets to the sheepmen. It is mostly occupied by California herders who drive over from the other side.
