A MALODOROUS SCANDAL

The sickening exposures now being made of the methods of the beef trust touches the American people on a tender spot—their stomachs. It has been asserted that a man's pocket is a tender spot, but if this were true the American public would not submit to the heaving exactions of the tariff.

During the Spanish war it was demonstrated that the beef packers sold embalmed and diseased meat to the government. The soldiers who were fighting the battles of their country, were compelled to face the Spanish guns in front, and embalmed beef in the rear, and the putrid beef killed more of them than the Spanish artillery. The rotten beef had the advantage of closer range.

During the investigation that followed these exposures, a can of the embalmed beef on exhibition in court exploded from pent up gasses, and the stench was so overpowering that the court was driven from the room, and clerks in the building several stories above were compelled to seek the air of the street.
