

SUCCESS OF A BOY WHO LEARNED HIS TRADE IN THE APPEAL OFFICE

HOW ROBERT DAVIS, FORMERLY OF THE APPEAL OPENED THE FIGHT ON THE BEEF TRUST.

The last issue of the "Editor and Publisher," a newspaper journal published in New York, has a full page picture of "Bob" Davis, formerly of The Appeal, and a history of what it designates as the "greatest scoop in modern journalism."

It says: "Bob Davis is known to every newspaper man in New York and to most of the editors of the big dailies in the United States. His personality is not merely striking. It is vivid. Above all else he is the newspaper man who wrote the biggest beat of modern American journalism, considering the results which followed the exposure."

"It was the story of 'Embellished Beef' sold to the U. S. Army during the Spanish war. It was Davis who exposed the inside workings of the beef trust seven years ago. Sinclair has written a book and put the facts in new form and the public mind is more receptive now than when Davis made his first memorable exposure that resulted in the terrible story going to the world and the court-martial of Gen. Egan."

"In 1899 Gen. Nelson A. Miles, charged that the beef trust was supplying embellished beef to the U. S. commissary department and the beef trust denied it. Hearst picked half a dozen of his crack men to go to Packington and investigate the facts, but they all came back without any facts. Sam Chamberlain, managing editor of the Journal suggested Bob Davis as the one man who could land the goods. Davis took the detail and was ten days in Packington. When he came out he had the facts and in such unmistakable form that they could not be controverted. Then followed the investigation in which Gen. Miles, a brave and honest soldier, was discredited and humiliated by the infamous beef ring."

Sinclair is now using the documentary evidence obtained by Davis, and the fight will go with the powerful Hearst newspapers behind it. Davis is now the right hand man of Munsey in his magazine publications and his strong personality is seen in them all."
