

**A PROTEST AGAINST WHOLESALE LOCATIONS**

A correspondent writes to The Appeal suggesting changes in the state mining laws.

The communication is as follows: "One of the weak spots in the mining laws of the state, in my opinion is, that one prospector can stake any number of claims in a district, in fact, can stake a whole district, and tie it up for 90 days.

"To prevent this wholesale staking by one individual and at the same time increase the state's revenue without making a hardship on the prospector, should be the aim of those state officials who have a chance to present their views to the legislature.

"Were the state to license prospectors, as is done in British Columbia, wholesale staking would be prevented and the state's revenue would be increased without making any hardship on prospectors.

"The fee for a prospector's license, would not be higher than \$5, and all licenses would expire on a fixed date, say June 30th of each year. No location of mining ground to be valid, unless the locator holds a prospector's license, and no claim to be stated in the name of a person who is not the holder of such a license. No license holder to be allowed to locate more than three claims in any one mining district for himself, (or herself) and the same number as an agent for other persons holding license (one for each person).
