The Hawaiian Rebellion.

A Washington dispatch of the 11th instant says:

"Nothing is known at the State Department of the revolution in Hawaii beyond what was printed in this morning's papers. The Albatross, the Vandalia and a third naval vessel are known to be in the neighborhood of Honolulu, if not at that port, and it is believed that they are fully able to protect the interests of the United States. It is the general opinion in Washington that the affair has no significance from an international point of view, but is simply the protest of the business people of the Island against financial mismanagement on the part of the ministers of the King, and the consequent imposition of oppressive taxes."

The position of affairs in the Hawaiian Islands is as follows: Walter M. Gibson, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Premier, and his son-in-law, F. H. Hayselden, are under arrest. David Kalakaua, King, has made unconditional surrender to the demands of the people. Virtually he is no longer King, and the Government is in the hands of the reformers, and the first step has been taken toward a Hawaiian republic.

The climax was reached on the afternoon of June 30th, and the end was yet to come when the steamer Mariposa sailed for San Francisco on the 2d instant.

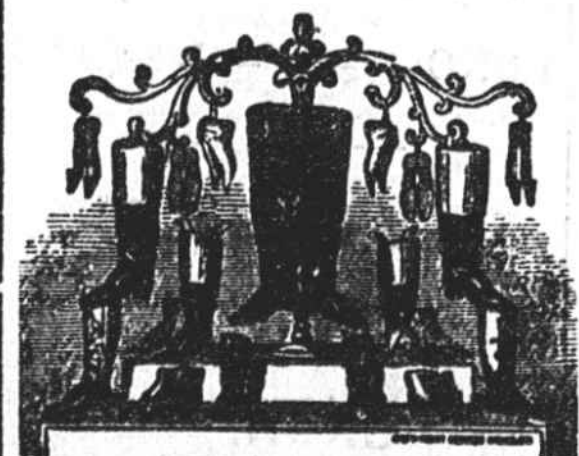
