THE WAR OVER.

A Telegram from Crook Himself.—The Chiricahua Surrender. (SPECIAL TO THE SENTINEL.) SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—The following dispatch from Gen. Crook was received at military headquarters this afternoon:

Silver Creek, A. T., 12 miles north of boundary, via Tombstone. I left here May 1 with 193 Apache scouts under Crawford. I got word to Mackey with Chaffrey's company of 42 men of the Sixth Cavalry. We had rations for two months packed on mules.

We followed the hostile Chiricahua into a country of indescribable roughness. A number of mules lost their footing, and slipping from the trail, fell down a precipice and were killed. The stronghold of the Chiricahua was in the very heart of the Sierra Madre, a position finely watered and having a dense growth of timber and plenty of game.
