BRIEF MENTION.

McGinley, the man of many stabs, is still improving.

The roads between here and Dayton are in good condition.

A girl in Silver lies in bed until 10 o'clock, because it is sleep-year.

The Silver City Miners' Union held their semi-annual election last evening.

At the weekly election match in Dayton on Friday night, Harry Rulison carried off the honors.

Monday being the first pleasant day Dayton has had for some time, the children petitioned for and received a holiday.

Last Sunday night a trial trip of the new compressed air locomotive was made in the Suro Tunnel. General satisfaction is expressed at the performance of the machine—the mules concur.

A rancher of Carson Valley testified lately in the District Court "that wood was worth \$8 per cord piled on the river bank. If this is true the cultivation of pine trees should form a profitable branch of agriculture in Nevada.

Mrs. C. S. McLaren, of San Francisco, with her two children, is at present visiting at the residence of her father, J. F. Angell. Mrs. McLaren was a resident of Silver a few years ago, and is right at home among her old friends.

Work was resumed yesterday on the Golden Star mine, situated about six miles north east of the mouth of Six-Mile Canyon, owned by Martin and Peter Cooney. This mine has been closed since 1870. The last ore extracted was worked at the mill of Barney and Evans.

It is rumored that E. A. Schultz, late Superintendent of the Bullion, will return to the Comstock to take charge of the Julia and Ward. Mr. Schultz will receive a hearty welcome. No Superintendent ever left Nevada with a better record of honest management, strict attention to his duties, and thorough understanding of his business.

Como Items.

The Welter mill started up Monday last, on ore from the old dump of the Ohio mine.

Geo. M. Reed and Geo. W. Barton have been appointed mail carriers from Dayton to Como.

The Eureka Company will send fifty tons of ore to be worked by the Lyon Mill and Mining Company, at Dayton. They began the extraction on the 1st of March.

The fourth shaft of the May Day mine is now down sixty feet, sinking on the ledge. They will send twenty-five tons of ore to Dayton for crushing in a few weeks.

The last storm at Como was the deepest fall of snow this winter. It is now rapidly disappearing. The roads are improving very fast, and in a few days travel over them will be easy.

Suro Gone at Last.

The resignation of A. Suro, Esq., as Superintendent of the Suro Tunnel, has been tendered and accepted. There were more dry eyes in the community on receipt of the news of this event, than have been seen for many years. Captain Taylor, of the Yellow Jacket is mentioned as a possible successor. J. D. Bethel is also named in the same connection, and as the one most likely to receive the appointment. Mr. Bethel was the first Assistant Superintendent at the Tunnel, and broke the ground when work was commenced. He is now on the Comstock, doubtless under instructions to be ready when needed.

Rules of Whist.

The following are among the rules adopted by our new Whist Club. They could be followed advantageously by whist players generally:

First.—Players are not to spit on their fingers when dealing.

THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Their Regular Meeting Last Monday—Bills Allowed—The Poll-Tax to be Collected Immediately.

At the regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners held in Dayton, last Monday, the following bills were passed upon and allowed: John Lothrop, Auditor and Recorder's fees, \$10 70; Banner Bros', clothing for patient in Storey county hospital, \$18 00; T. R. Hawkins, Justice's fees, \$10 00; J. G. Mackenzie, mileage and per diem as Commissioner, \$52 00; Geo. Burrier, mileage and per diem as Commissioner, \$60 00; J. R. Shaw, mileage and per diem as Commissioner, \$50 00; J. C. Hazlett, medicine for J. Bender, indigent sick, \$11 00; Dr. C. B. Brierty, medical services and examination of John Gavin on commission of lunacy, \$35 00; M. W. Stiles, care of John Bender, \$17 50; C. B. Burnap, services as jailer during month of February, \$104 40; J. A. Casebeer, Justice of the Peace fees in criminal cases, from January 1st to March 1st, \$39 45; S. B. Heidenrich, provision furnished to poor, \$24; J. L. Campbell, cash advanced to pay jury fees, \$82 75; J. E. Fair, Constable fees, from January 6 to March 14, \$81; Ripley & Haas, provision for indigent poor, \$108 63; Henry Hill, Constable fees, \$24; John Powell, Jr., services as District Attorney, trying case against Howie Ah Gowie for house breaking, \$50 00; R. A. Cooke, Sheriff bill for February, \$254 50; Mrs. M. L. Jaques, boarding jurymen, \$72 00; C. F. Reynolds, reporting testimony in case of State of Nevada vs. V. & T. R. R., \$23 85; T. G. Caldwell, services in taking care of and burying John Bender, \$20 75; A. J. Markwell, care of J. R. King, indigent sick, \$34 00; LYON COUNTY TIMES, advertising and printing, \$22; Henry Benness, work on roads, \$7 43; J. D. Sims, provision for poor, \$26 50; Israel Leversee, coffin and box for John Bender, \$39 25; R. A. Cooke, fees in case of State vs. V. & T. R. R., \$64 86; H. Kennedy, wood furnished county, \$131; W. J. Westfield, expenses of sickness and burial of E. Daggett, \$79 35; P. Barnes, team hire, \$10; John Lothrop, County Auditor services in February, \$104 20.

It was ordered by the Board that the County Auditor be authorized and instructed to commence the collection of poll-taxes immediately.

The Board also ordered that the County Treasurer be authorized to sell that certain lot formerly owned by A. P. Dallas, and sold to the county for taxes, situated on the south side of Main street, in Dayton, adjoining the Como Restaurant on the west, to W. W. Byron on payment of taxes, costs, and cost of making deed.

District Court Proceedings.

In the case of State vs. Howie Ah Gowie, Geo. W. Keith, counsel for defendant, moved for arrest of judgment. The motion was overruled. Prisoner sentenced to imprisonment for a term of four years.

In an Anton Petagua vs. Gabriel Thomas.—A suit for forcible detainer and ouster, appealed from Justice Court. On motion, of J. A. Stevens was entered as attorney of record for defendant. John Powell, Jr., appeared for plaintiff. On motion of counsel for appellant the action was dismissed, plaintiff to pay costs.

Kallmes vs. Cooke.—Suit to prevent Cooke from giving deeds for real estate sold, claimed by plaintiff. On motion and by stipulation on file, case continued for the term.

Cooney vs. Cordelli et al.—Injunction to prevent destruction of timber. Geo. W. Keith was on motion entered as attorney of record. Verdict for plaintiff one dollar damages.

M. Meyer vs. V. & T. R. R. Co. for burning property of plaintiff, Sims, Jaqua and Shaw. Decided in favor of Rail Road. John Powell, Jr. and Lewis & Deal appeared for plaintiff; B. C. Witman for defendant. Plaintiff has given notice of appeal.

The attorneys of the V. & T. R. R. Company have given the District Attorney notice that they will appeal the tax suit to the Supreme Court.

All jurymen were discharged for the term, and Court adjourned to March 4.

Trouble Between Stage Drivers.

On Monday last about 11:30 A. M., when the stages of the mail line and opposition arrived in front of the post office, the drivers, who had been disliking each other for some time, concluded to settle their difference. One remarked that the other was a low fellow, and made other observations to the same effect. The ensuing mill was short but spirited, and ended when one of the Jehus acquainted the by-standers with the fact that he was entirely satisfied with his share. 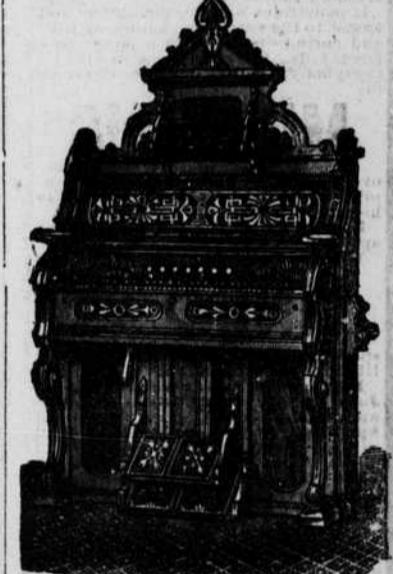
