MORGAN COUNTY.

STATE ELECTION.

The Republican State Ticket is elected by over 15,000 to 20,000. The Republicans will have a majority of electors in the House, and it will be a tie in the Senate. The Prohibition vote in the State will be upward of 5,000, as now evidenced by the negro accounts the old party papers give relative to it. A correspondent of the Cincinnati Gazette, in last Monday's issue of that paper, in referring to the Prohibition vote, and the total tendency of the people independent political action, says: "The people of Ohio have exhibited an independence in the matter of voting for persons to hold the great offices, which is perhaps unparalleled in the history of our State. This will be seen conspicuously by comparing the votes for electors of each county with the vote for Representative. In nearly every case there is a marked difference, and in very many cases the difference is such as to give a very significant result. It is certain that had not the Prohibition vote been able to appeal to the people on the ground of the moral importance of the vote, it would have been a mere curiosity. It is exceptional in view of the choice of United States Senator, and of the pending contest for reelection for Congress. There would have been such a lessening of way from party ties and trammels as would have utterly annihilated those positions, and laid all previous elections as a result."

THE LATEST DEPARTURE.

SHALL THE DEMOCRATS MAKE A PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION?

From the St. Louis Republican, (Democratic paper), of October 15th: The active canvassing of candidates for the Democratic Presidential nomination in 1872 that took place prior to the election in California and Maine has been followed by a more careful reflection on the whole subject, and one startling result of this reconsideration is a suggestion of the question whether the Democratic nomination at all. The idea is started, because it is without a precedent in our national politics, and is profoundly interesting as furnishing a precedent itself. The present theory of party politics is that in important contests both parties must place tickets in the field, even although one of them goes through the formality with the consciousness that the ticket will be certainly defeated. The new theory, the contrary, assumes the possibility of a change of conditions which will be better for one party not to make a nomination at all, but leave the field to its antagonists, in the almost absolute certainty that its antagonists will then divide and present two tickets. While, however, there is no national precedent for such a course, the experiment is not an untried one; the campaign last fall in Missouri furnished a though example of the new idea, and it is the very beneficial and generally satisfactory result of that example that has suggested a repetition of it on a national scale in the Presidential contest of next year. It is asked, why should not an experiment that proved so successful in breaking the power of Radicalism in Missouri be employed to break the power of Radicalism in the Union? Why should not the whole country be delivered from a party that is essentially prohibitive, oppressive, unconstitutional and violent in its policy and practice in the same old-fashioned way in which a single State found such deliverance? The result of the Missouri election in 1870 was not, indeed a Democratic victory, but it was certainly a Radical defeat, and the abolition of a disreputable element, the subversion of anti-Republican sentiment, the restoration of a more conservative and patriotic feeling, and the revival of a liberal interest in public affairs had in local affairs been followed by that defeat.

are consequences which vindicate the wisdom of the experiment in Missouri, and, at least, suggest its repetition in a larger field. The contradictory and discordant nature of the several State platforms, both Democratic and Republican, that were presented to us in the past few months, show that both parties have lost their rest, and are fastening upon the people wildly the Constitutional Amendments and the legislation of Congress since the war have eliminated several very important subjects of difference and dispute from our national policies, and the result is a vacuum which condenses both parties. The only common conviction in the Republican party is that it ought to be kept in power, to give to each party the reins of government in its turn for six years; and the prominent conviction of the Democratic party, to which all questions of tariff, finance, annexation and foreign relations are subordinate, is that the Republican party ought to be overthrown, and a gentler policy instituted for the redemption of the country from an us. The Virginia convention in their late State Convention, decline to adopt the usual resolutions, and contented themselves with proposing as their sole platform, "opposition to Radicalism." The fact expresses a common Democratic instinct, and expresses, too, a feeling which all the liberal and reflecting element of the Republican party share. But how is this opposition to be successful? How is the Republican party to be displaced? How is such a consummation to be effected in which the teeth of the rigorous semi-military laws which has devised, expressly to enable it to carry election and protect itself from defeat? How is the Administration party to be beaten in 1872, when the people believe that it will be unable to defeat, and will uphold President Grant in any measures he may take to avoid it? Or even if we could have a perfectly free election in all the States, without Executive interference, and with the certainty that the party in power would cheerfully submit to the result, what assurances have the Democrats that they can carry the country with a nominee of their party, in the face of the defeat they have recently encountered in California, Pennsylvania and Ohio?

These are the questions which the advocates of the no nomination policy ask themselves; and even if they are not satisfied of the merits of their policy, they are not less desirous to be thoroughly informed. It is worthy of small account, and of less consequence, that the Union maintained its present unshaken unbroken position, for the last four years, and that the Executive interference presented in the progress of centralization modern completion, and that these things are to be arrested at all the Radical party must be thrust out of Washington, just as it was unseated in Missouri, by the Democrats abstaining from a Presidential nomination, and leaving the nomination of a ticket which they may support to the liberal element of the other party. To the Democrats could hope to nominate a Presidential ticket, and elect it, without a check or any obstacle, at the head, would not the victor be checked, do fairly and honestly? Would not the Radical Congress, by the hands of the Democratic President, and give us the history of the American Union Administration over again? On the other hand, with Grant and the Administration party overwhelmingly defeated, as McCullough was defeated in Missouri, a liberal and patriotic Republican, made President, and a majority of Democrats and Liberals chosen to Congress, would not the result, though materially different from a full Democratic triumph, be an inevitable improvement on the present order of things? It would, in fact, involve no concession, and would make the Democracy would find it hard to make but would not the happy deliverance of harassed Southern States, and their restoration to the equality and dignity they are now deprived from, be a sufficient compensation for these concessions? And would not the moral restoration of the Union which followed the triumph of the new party be its prepetual claim on the gratitude and confidence of the people?
