

**A Rich Muss!**

**Arrest and Release of Prisoners—Resistance of the Government Authorities—Springfield and Xenia Abolitionists in Arms—United States Officials Imprisoned.**

Some of our contemporaries, here and elsewhere, lately had an account, more or less erroneously detailed, of an attempt that was made last week by some Deputy United States Marshal from this city, Hamilton and other towns to arrest fugitive slave, owned in Kentucky, and who had been harbored, fed and employed near Mechanicsburg, Champaign county. The attempt to arrest, we might as well here premise, was then unsuccessful, the negro having retreated to the left of the log cabin of his harboring and employer, which owing to its peculiar construction, was as good to him as a fort, having entrance way only to one head and body at a time, and from which he bid defiance to the force in pursuit of him—one of the Deputies barely escaping being made a target for a well aimed bullet, discharged from the pistol of the fugitive.

Owing then to the danger which would have to be encountered in an attempt to dislodge the negro from his fastness, and the threatened violent resistance which his harboring had summoned to his aid, in the presence of some dozen or more of the neighbors, an attempt of the village, pursuit was temporarily abandoned, that a better organized plan might be matured and put in execution. This was done, and on Monday evening a party of regular and special deputies, numbering some half dozen or more, started upon the cars; not only in the enterprise to pursue, and, if found, arrest the fugitive slave, but also armed with authority and process of law to arrest all who had been known as harbors and protectors of the negro and resistants of the first attempt to secure him.

This party of officials, as we have it from verbal report, were not able to find the negro—he having been smart enough to take the Underground Railroad train, but they took into custody, as we are advised, some six of the aforesaid special conductors of the Underground Express. The officers and their prisoners, yesterday morning, had safely progressed so far on their way to Xenia, when their further progress was arrested by a local official springing upon them with a writ of *habeas corpus*, issued by some State Judge in Clark county.

This local official had for aid a large gang of the Abolitionist, of Springfield and Xenia; and sufficiently strong to overpower the deputy Marshals, who were there arrested and taken back to Springfield. Thus the arrests were completely turned. The arrested parties were discharged out of the custody of the deputies, and the latter were *jugged*, and are now "living upon the vapors of a dungeon!"

As this last phase in the matter is only a fair beginning in another exciting and perplexing *vicar*, to be followed for some time to come, we will, by other demonstrations, in which National and State authorities will again be brought into hazardous conflict, we shall avail ourselves of such opportunities as may be presented to keep our readers reliably posted. As judges Melean and Leavitt are both absent from the city at this time, there will be necessarily be a delay in the proceedings essential to deliver the deputies from the hospitalities of the Springfield jailer. In the mean time we hope the *new prisoners* will bear their honors with proper meekness, and join their friends down here in good spirits—as soon as they can get out—*Cin. Inquirer*.

**WASHINGTON, Tuesday, June 2.**

Major McCullough has again emphatically declined the Governorship of Utah. A selection will, however, positively be made in a few days, when the vacant position for that Territory will be filled and other measures be adopted, with a view to an effective organization of the Administration machinery. Richardson, of Illinois, Governor of Nebraska. Isaac R. Diller, of Illinois, Consul to Bremen, vice Hilbrand. William Thompson, of New York, Consul to Southampton, England, vice Crosby. Gabriel G. Fleuret, of New York, Consul to Bordeaux, to fill the existing vacancy.
