Is Rollins an Emancipationist? The Black Republican papers in the North generally claim the election of Rollins in Missouri, for Governor, as a triumph of emancipation in that State. In so doing they either evince great ignorance of his position, or are guilty of unparalleled dishonesty. The St. Louis Intelligencer of May 2, the leading Know-Nothing paper in the State, and one of his chief supporters, contained a letter from him, in which occurred this sentence: "The effort of Passhall and others will be to identify me with the emancipation movement in St. Louis, and thus alarm Americans and slave-owners in the country. Opposed as I am to emancipation and all agitation of the slavery question, my friends must guard this point. I do not claim to be the peculiar advocate of slavery. I am nevertheless, the owner of between twenty and thirty slaves, and I have the control of as many more that I do not own."

Not satisfied with defining his own position most explicitly, as being "opposed to emancipation" and slavery agitation, in his speech in Johnson County, he brought it as a public reproach against Stewart, the Democratic candidate, that "he having the means, and having been so long a resident of the State, should never have bought a nigger."

FIREMAN'S PARADE.—On the 10th of September there is to be a grand fireman's parade at Dayton, Ohio. Companies are expected from some thirty or forty towns and cities. It will be a grand affair. Major Lee, late United States Consul at Basle, died of lock-jaw in Washington on Saturday last week ago. He had been accidentally wounded in the foot by a pistol in his own hand. His remains were conveyed to Virginia. Hon. J. L. Dawson is at present on a visit to the Lake Superior country. His health is improving.

It is worthy of remark, that while the Democrats, in their State Convention, denounce both the robbers of the State Treasury and ask for their condemnation, and also called for the passage of a law that would prevent defalcation in future, the Black-Republicans were silent on the latter measure, and adopted a very weak and faint resolution in regard to the other. The great cause of the insecurity of the State funds is the power of the Treasurer to loan them out to banks and brokers to trade and speculate upon. The Democrats believe that the State should keep its own money in its own Treasury, and that the people should not be called upon to pay taxes until the time the money is wanted for use. They believe the money should remain in the pockets of the people and in the State Treasury, instead of being in the hands of favored and unsafe bankers to speculate upon. The Black-Republicans are in favor of the same bad system of fiscal management by which the State has lost two hundred thousand dollars the last two years. Which of these two plans the people prefer, they will indicate by their vote in October.—Cin Eng.
