DEMOCRATIC MEETING.

At a regular meeting of the Democratic Central Committee, of Preble County, Ohio, held at Eaton, on Saturday, August 29, 1857, it was Resolved, That a Convention be held at Eaton, on the 15th day of September, 1857, for the purpose of recommending a candidate for the offices of Senator, for the Senatorial District, composed of Preble and Montgomery Counties; and for the nomination of a candidate for Representative; and for the transaction of such other business as may be deemed necessary.

Resolved, That we recommend to the Democracy of each Township in the County, to select at their earliest convenience, five delegates in each Township to attend said Convention.

Bent on Beating Chase.

The Zanesville Courier, Republican paper, says that about one hundred and fifty of the Fillmore men of Muskingum county, held a meeting at Zanesville on Saturday and decided to support the whole of the Democratic State ticket.—The negro equality doctrines of the Black Republican Governor are held in deserved detestation in Old Muskingum. The Democratic State ticket will have a large majority in the county. All the old line Whigs are for it, as well as the Fillmore men. Indeed we are informed by the best authority, that the old line Whigs all over the State are thoroughly roused, and resolved to defeat the Congo party in October.

More Disaffection.

The Black Republican Executive Committee of Hamilton County have passed a resolution to the effect that Mr. Blickensderfer be requested to withdraw from their State ticket. They have forwarded a copy of it to Mr. B. and to the State Executive Committee. The Black Republicans of Lorain County, in convention assembled, have resolved that Mr. Blickensderfer's name be omitted from the Black Republican tickets in that county. Mr. Blickensderfer, in the meantime, asserts that he will not withdraw, and that, if any attempt is made to take him off the ticket, it will result in the overwhelming defeat of Chase and all his associates.

We notice that our friend Judge Wm. R. Kinder, has again taken charge of the editorial columns of the Hamilton Telegraph. The Judge is a ready and forcible writer, and the way he will make the "stock-holders" of the underground rail road squint, will be astonishing to their "able" passengers.

The Campaign Opened!

We suppose the campaign is now opened for certain, as the Black Republican candidate for Senator said he opened it in his speech on Monday night last. How little feeling there is in party—Daniel Webster was called up sans culottes to ratify the nomination of his rival, and Gen. Marsh chosen to introduce Moses B. Walker to an audience consisting of perhaps, twenty-five Black Republicans, nearly an equal number of Democrats, and a few boys, at about eight and half o'clock. Moses opened his speech by apologizing for the lateness of his arrival, having made a long speech, of perhaps an hour, in West Alexandria, and attended to some private personal affairs. So far the campaign opened well. He commenced by stating that he was "a full grown Black Republican," a fact never omitted by a vote hunter. Then he avowed his intention to act honestly in his official capacity, if elected—another declaration the Black Republican office-seekers are generally particular to keep before the people, to deceive them.—He stated that the field in which he was called to, would of course lead to an examination of State matters, and touched upon the defalcation of the State Treasurer, and pronounced both Treasurers guilty in his opinion. This in fact was the substance of his reference to State matters. The field was too narrow, for now, all, from candidates for State Senatorship down to Constable and hog reeves, must go into an exposition of the Constitution of the United States, and show that there is no such thing as property in slaves, and that the Democratic party are sectional, and they are national, or else they are not suitable men for State Senators, Constables, and hog reeves. On the slavery question, it having so intimate (?) a connection with the office of a State Senator in Ohio, Moses warmed up. He shrieked, and said he was unmasking the Democratic party. He became pathetic and went back two hundred years to the landing of the pilgrims to show that they were Black Republicans, and we expected when he was along there that the meeting would close with a voluntary hymn from the worshippers.

The Defalcation.

Every thing being Black Republican paper in the State, from the Cincinnati Gazette and Ohio State Journal, down to the Eaton Register, is now busy in trying to relieve Gibson of the stupendous robbery of the public funds and shield him from merited condemnation. The records of the State prove him guilty—Chase's message—Auditor Wright's testimony—Kelly's report—the reports of all the Committees of Investigation, show that the money was in his hands and was lost whilst he was in office.—No felon was ever convicted on stronger testimony than that which stamps guilt on the brow of Gibson. No white-washing reports can now satisfy intelligent men that he is innocent. With the record evidence before him no honest man will suffer himself to be deceived by the lies of Black Republican papers.

The Difference.

The Democratic State Convention boldly and strongly denounced both Gibson and Breslin for their defalcation; the Black Republican State Convention, in its resolutions, barely alluded in the most remote and gentle manner to the state treasury, without daring to name and censure defaulting officers. The speakers in the Democratic Convention could find no language too emphatic to portray the baseness of those who robbed the State Treasury and stole the people's money; not a speaker in the Black Republican Convention made an allusion, even to the heavy robbery which Gibson and his brother-in-law have perpetrated upon the people of Ohio.

The St. Paul Daily Times says:

We have been shown the device of the Seal and Coat of Arms adopted by the Republican Convention for our future State. It represents a waterfowl, supposed to be that of Minnehaha—within a shield, symbolizing the abundant and varied water power and privilege in the State. An Indian figure with his face toward the setting sun, and tomahawk and arrows at his feet. Opposite is the figure of a white man, with a sheaf of wheat and agricultural implements.—The Indian is represented as asking of the white man whether he shall go, and the white man pointing to the implements, as if he would direct him in the habits of civilized life. In one corner, a distant view of Lake Superior and sail; in the other, the Minnesota River and a Steamer. The three pine regions of the St. Croix, Mississippi and Lake Superior are represented by three pine trees. The motto to accompany the words "State of Minnesota, A. D. 1857, is in these words:—"Liberty and Union."

If you want to make a Black Republican angry, just ask him to give you in figures the amount of money saved to the people of Ohio by the "Retrenchment and Reform" Legislature and the "Retrenchment and Reform" State officials. The way they will swear will be worse than my Uncle Toby's Army in Flanders!

WARD, and other talented and popular speakers will be on hand, able and ready to explain how it is that three years ago, when the present negro-worshipping administration assumed the controlling power in our State, they found her in a flourishing and prosperous condition, with abundant means to liquidate all her indebtedness, by proper management, in a very short time, and now in the fall of 1857, they are about to make a shameful retreat from the positions they have so ingloriously occupied, leaving the State "hopelessly insolvent." Come out then, and hear a part of the unvarnished history of Black Republican office-holders and office-seekers. Come and hear their actual practice compared with their pledges and professions.

The sham republican party claim that Gov. Chase has conducted the affairs of State, in such an admirable manner that he ought not to be neglected. A little acquaintance with his financing will convince any sensible mind, that he is wholly unfit for his position. When he succeeded Gov. Medill the credit of Ohio stood fair—Ohio stock was worth from \$1.00 to \$1.15, when Gov. Chase took charge of State affairs.

But how is it now? Ohio stocks are quoted at 90 from twenty to twenty-five per cent. less, than when we had a democratic Governor, Under Gov. Chase \$2,500, 000 were sold at only three cents above par, and when Gov. Medill was at the head of affairs in Ohio they sold nine to fifteen cents above par. Now how can any sensible man say that a Governor who bankrupts the credit of the State, puts her stocks that were selling at fifteen cents above par down below par, is fit to be Governor of Ohio? The fact is Chase is ignorant of the responsibility of his position, or has forgot his duties in looking after Kansas. The people want a man to look after our own affairs instead of "bleeding Kansas."

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1st. That the Republican party was organized as an opposition to the fundamental principle of the Constitution, and, basis of all free institutions—"Popular Sovereignty." 2d. That the miserable existence of the Republican party has been thus far prolonged by the unnatural, intestine of Kansas, incited and nourished by Republican leaders for party ends. 3d. That the history of the Republican party is a record of treason, anarchy and revolution; that the Constitution is set at naught, and sister States at variance with each other. 4th. That the Republican party endeavored to stop the wheels of government and paralyze every department of State by refusing to pass the general appropriation bills. 5th. That the Republicans have used every exertion to make Kansas a Slave State for the purpose of procuring capital against the Democracy in the approaching campaign. 6th. That the Republican candidate for governor always makes a mental reservation when he takes an oath to support the Constitution. 7th. That the Republican Legislature promised retrenchment. They fulfilled by relieving us of our school libraries, dispensing with the payment of the public debt, and yet our taxes are the same. 8th. That the Republicans introduced a bill into the Ohio Legislature asking to have the word "white" struck from the Constitution, thus placing the negro on a level with the white man. Also a bill to compel the foreigner to go to the Superior Courts for their naturalization papers; placing the foreigners below the negro. 9th. That that the Republican party introduced a bill into the Legislature authorizing the Governor to appropriate one hundred thousand dollars of the peoples money to aid the rebellion and bloodshed in Kansas. 10th. That the petition was presented by Republicans to the Ohio Legislature praying for withdrawal of Ohio from the Union. 11th. That the Republican Legislature passed a bill repealing the contracts of the State associating us with Mississippi, which is financially, a hissing and by-word. 12th. That the late Republican legislature did nothing for the public weal, occupying its entire time in passing resolutions in relation to Switzerland and Kansas. 13th. That according to the Republican Committee, a Republican Treasurer has swindled the State out of half a million of dollars. 14th. That the Republican party is the greatest humbug ever imposed upon the American people, and is destined to be routed this Fall, horse foot and dragoon.—District Democrat.

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
