Normal Institute.

The Preble County Teachers Institute will commence its annual session, the 19th of the present month. It is hoped that the teachers of this county will give a full attendance; preparations have been made to have a profitable and interesting session. Lecturers of known ability will be present. This section of Ohio holds a front rank as regards common schools. Commissioner Smyth in his very able report says:—"But it is important to consider that nearly all the Institutes which are so managed as to be of benefit to those who attend them are held in Districts where the Teachers are already far in advance as to qualifications of four fifths of the Teachers of the State. Only four continued so long as four weeks; and three of these were held in the adjoining counties of Montgomery, Preble and Warren."

It is gratifying to know that the profession is beginning to be appreciated and let us continue to elevate rather than lower the standard. In addition to the regular course of instruction, several evening lectures will be given during the Session, by some of the ablest men that can be procured in the West. These are: *The Three Dollars per Session.* Good boarding may be had for from \$2.25 to \$3.00 per week.
