Addressed to His Excellency, Abraham Lincoln, President U. S. A.

LETTER VII.

HONORED SIR, - In my last week's letter, I promised to show the illegality and unconstitutionality of your proceedings, as President of the United States of America.

You are the President, but whether your deeds and doings are legal and constitutional, is another question. Most men are wise in their own eyes, - it is so with me, and I think it is so with you!

Still, the question has to be solved, whether you, as our President, have a legal and moral right to trample upon our laws, and to turn the Constitution of the United States into a fable.

HONORED SIR, permit me to call your serious attention - for this is a serious time in the history of the civilized world - to what is going on under your Administration.

The law of the United States declares, that no new State shall be formed or created within the jurisdiction of any other State; nor shall any State be formed by the junction of two or more States, or parts of States, without the consent of the Legislatures of the States, as well as of the Congress.

Yet, sir, in the face of this wise, safe, profound, and masterly proviso, and legal and constitutional provision against all encroachment upon the rights, privileges, and liberties of the great American Democracy, both you and the Congress have proposed to erect Western Virginia into a separate State!

Hear it, O heavens, and be astonished, O earth!

Sir, these things are neither righteous nor seemly. It is righteousness that "exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people."

General Butler's proclamation at New Orleans, has led to more desperate secession than the Devil's war against God and His Christ did in heaven. Sir, too many of your generals and advisers have done far more injury to the cause they have professed to serve, than the avowed enemies of the Union.

Pray, sir, stand and ask "for the good old paths," and America may yet find rest to her soul. But I fear, that under your iron hoof, the Great Republic has fallen.

Official Report of the Kingston Affair. I have the honor to inform that I left Newburyport on the 11th inst., but that owing to the bad roads and the delays to my train, did not reach South-west Creek, five miles from this town, until the forenoon of the 13th. The enemy was posted there, but by a heavy artillery fire in the front, and a vigorous infantry attack on either flank, I succeeded in forcing a passage and without much loss.

This morning I advanced on this town, and found the enemy strongly posted at a defile through a marsh, bordering on a creek. The position was so well chosen that very little of our artillery could be brought in play. The main attack was, therefore, made by the infantry, assisted by a few guns pushed forward into the woods. After a five hours' hard fight we succeeded in driving the enemy from his position. We followed him rapidly to the river. The bridge over the Neuse, at this point, was prepared for firing, and was fired in six places, but we were so close behind them that we saved the bridge.

The enemy retreated precipitately by the Goldsboro and Pikeville Roads. Their force was about 6,000 men, with twenty pieces of artillery, taken 400 to 500 prisoners, and found a large amount of Quartermaster and Commissary stores. Our loss will probably not exceed 200 killed and wounded.

Is it a crime to imperil the lives of fifteen hundred men? The rotten transports in which part of General Banks' expedition left this port are reported from day to day as having put into different harbors in distress. One of them, the steamer Thames, was towed into Port Royal last week, utterly disabled, and was condemned after examination. She had on board the One Hundred and Fourteenth Regiment of New York Volunteers. The Niagara, an old lake steamer, entirely unseaworthy, put into Philadelphia yesterday in a leaky condition, and the soldiers who kept her afloat by active pumping discovered that her timbers were rotten. She had on board five hundred men of the Fifth Massachusetts Regiment, still a third vessel of this expedition, the Quincy, carrying the Forty-second Massachusetts Regiment, and one hundred men of the Twenty-eighth Connecticut, is reported at Port Royal with defective boilers.
