DYNAMITE DEVILS.

ANOTHER ATTEMPT TO BLOW UP THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT HOUSE.

And other Government Buildings in London.

London, England, was thrown into a tremendous excitement last Saturday afternoon by three successive explosions in the Parliament House, Westminster Hall and the Tower, which proved to be the work of the dynamite fiends, who have heretofore made similar attempts upon the Government buildings in the British capital.

There is little doubt that an organized gang exists in this country, by which these dynamite outrages are planned and executed through hired agents sent to England for that nefarious purpose.

We are glad to see that Senator Edmunds, of Vermont, has introduced a bill to punish all persons in this country who are convicted of complicity in these devilish outrages against a friendly nation with which we are at peace.

THE COLLEGE ANTI-LIQUOR LAW.

Its Constitutionality Affirmed.

The Supreme Court Commission of this State made an important decision last week, sustaining the constitutionality of the law known as the "College Law," authorizing the Councils of all towns and villages in Ohio, within whose limits there is a college or university, to regulate the liquor traffic.

10. Bronson vs. The Village of Oberlin. Reserved in the District Court of Lorain county.

1. The act of March 29, 1885 (79 O. L., 59), authorizing incorporated villages having within their limits a college or university, to provide against the evils resulting from the sale of intoxicating liquors therein, is not repugnant to the provisions of the Constitution.

2. A village Council acting under the authority conferred by this law exceeds its power when it makes an ordinance which prohibits the sale of intoxicating liquors to all persons, and for all purposes, except mechanical and medicinal, and the sections of the ordinance so providing are void.

It will be remembered that the brilliant legal luminaries of the Hillsboro Gazette took it upon themselves to pronounce the College Law unconstitutional when our town Council had an ordinance before it last summer which was based upon the provisions of the law.

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the law was constitutional, and now they are sustained by the decision of the Supreme Court Commission. The Court, however, while declaring the law constitutional in effect, decides that the Oberlin Council went too far in entirely prohibiting the traffic, and that it only had the power to "provide against the evils resulting therefrom" by regulating and restraining it.
