**SHIFTED**

To Shoulders of the Board.

Council Through With Grant St. Matter.

Seems To Be Sorry That It Spoke.

After stirring up a big rumpus, the City Council has washed its hands of the Grant st. paving scandal and shifted the whole weight of responsibility onto the Board of City Commissioners.

A large number of Grant st. citizens were at the Council meeting Monday evening, and they were told by both the Councilmen and City Solicitor that Council can do nothing for them. "The Council, as has been explained ever since the Commissioner law has been in force, is merely a legislative body," said Solicitor Esqgate. "It can do little more than approve acts of the Board or make requests to the Commissioners, after passing legislation authorizing the Board to make improvements."

"But if we don't get what we're paying for, have we no recourse from acts of the Board?" asked a Grant st. citizen.

"You can go into the courts," said the Solicitor. "If the Board accepts the improvement made by the contractor, he must be paid. Council may hold up estimates for awhile, but it can be mandamus into ordering them paid, unless the courts, for some good reason, holds otherwise. Your only recourse from acts of the Board is the courts."

"But, if it is shown that the work has not been done right, can we be forced to pay for it?" asked a property owner.

"In that case, the city can assess you for the amount that you have been benefited. If you are not benefited to the full amount of the specifications in the contract, you can be assessed in part."

Councilman Sawyer explained to the citizens that Council could do one thing for them. "If you have spoken to the Commissioners about this matter, and they have neglected to heed your requests, Council has the power to oust the Board."

A number of the property owners claimed that they had spoken to members of the Board nearly two months ago, pointing out to them that the terms of the contract were not being lived up to.

Commissioner Houser denied that any one had spoken to him, relative to the slag, over which the controversy arose. He said that some objections had been made to the changing of the kind of brick designated in the contract, for use on the hill, but he said he was willing to stand by the position he took then that standard-size brick is better than block for use on the hill.

Councilman Sawyer asked all who were in favor of ousting the Board to stand up. Only two arose. "All who are in favor of allowing the Board to remain in office rise," continued Mr. Sawyer. No one got up. This proceeding caused a great deal of laughter.
