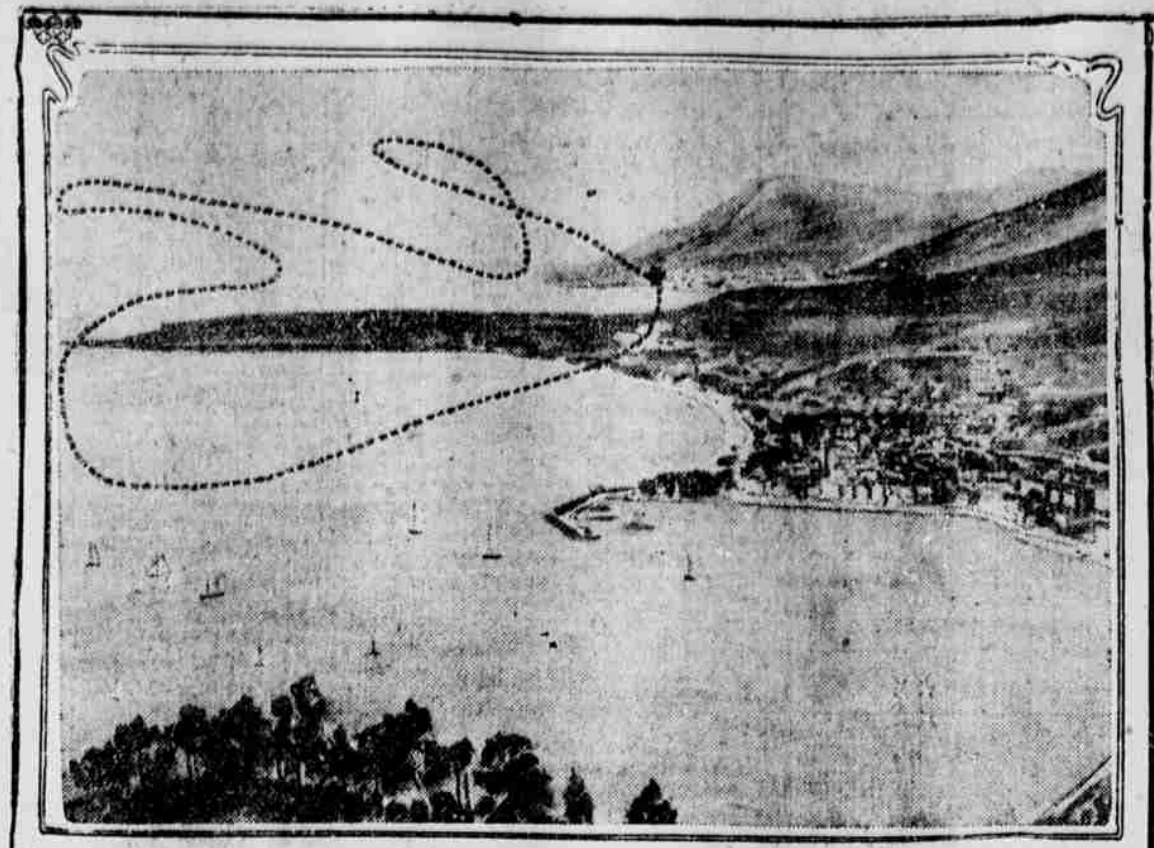

### Santos-Dumont Flew About Like a Bird.

The two preliminary trials which renewed the interest felt throughout the world in the experiments being made by M. Santos-Dumont in his efforts to solve the problem of dirigibility in aeroplanes.

Recent ascents were made to furnish M. Santos-Dumont with additional data as to the air currents of the Mediterranean, and as soon as he has made a sufficient number of observations he will start on the long and perilous trip from Monte Carlo across the sea to Tunis. From the manner in which the new airship worked yesterday, it is to be understood that the sixth of the famous machines he has built is the best of the series, and the only aerodrome yet constructed which could be expected to fulfill in any way the requirements of a trip of six hundred miles across the open sea.

Whether or not M. Santos-Dumont will make the entire trans-Mediterranean trip contemplated will depend upon the success of the preliminary flight to Corsica. Should he reach that island without accident, he has said that he will then take the long flight across the open water.

#### EXPRESSIVE PHRASES.

Those Which Foreigners Coming to America Learn to Use First.

Every man or woman who lands in this country is saying "Hurry up" in two months. In whatever quarter of the city one may walk, Italian or German or Jewish, mothers will be dispatching their offspring on errands, using their native speech, but closing their orders with the magic "Hurry up!" How delightfully characteristic of the nation is the phrase! It is not to be wondered at that the newcomers from the slow moving old world find that they have brought over nothing to equal it.

"All right" rivals "hurry up," not because foreign tongues lack similar expressions, but because there is a jolly, half lolling well met air about "All right" lacking in other phrases of the same character. Then, too, "All right" takes the place not only of "Good," but of "Yes" and "I understand" and of a dozen other phrases which in other languages require separate expressions.

The third phrase, which alone shares the popularity of the first two, is, "It's nice." This should be interesting to purists who wish to restrict "nice" to its first and original meaning of "exact." No word of ancestry sufficiently aristocratic to please them takes the place of "nice" in its colloquial meaning, and foreigners clasp it with joy, wholly ignorant of the fact that they are outraging the feelings of anybody but so doing. Other phrases besides "Hurry up," "All right" and "It's nice" captivate the fancy of the newly landed, but these three reign supreme.—New York Tribune.

#### Snow From a Clear Sky.

The most wonderful snowstorms of all that may be seen every winter in the Adirondacks are those that prevail when the sky is cloudless. Of these there are several varieties. Every week or two we would see what looked like a fog form about the distant hills and then come drifting across the creek valley. Doubtless was a real snow laden cloud that had been drifting along until it struck our level (4,300 feet above the sea) in the Adirondacks, when the conditions became favorable for the release of its feathery burden.

We saw these clouds fill the air with flakes that were driven along almost horizontally by a strong gale, although the tops of our old hemlocks and spruces rose into the clear air and unobscured sunlight above the highest level of the snow producing air stratum. We even saw the snow so thick in the air about us that the trunks of trees six feet above the earth were not visible, although the treetops could be seen, and the sun shone down through the shallow storm with strength enough to cast distinct shadows.

We have stood on a quiet, sunlit hill-top and looked down into a valley less than 100 feet below us, where a snow-storm was raging with violence and the temperature was frigid.—Scribner's.

#### FLYING BULLETS.

One Way by Which They May Be Seen After Leaving the Rifle.

"I don't believe the story that bullets can be seen when fired from a gun," said the old soldier. "You know in the army there is a theory that men have seen bullets, but they never lived to tell of it, because the bullets were going straight for them and hit them in the eye. The only men who have seen the ordinary rifle bullets in transit are dead."

"No, they aren't," said the old hunter. "I have seen many bullets flying. One way by which you can see them plainly is by dipping them in glycerin before firing."

"Yes, you might trace them by the smoke then caused by air friction," said the veteran, "but you can't see the bullets."

"Oh, yes, you can," retorted the hunter. "If you watched them often during target practice, and any one can see the large caliber bullets, though I won't say as much for the tiny modern missiles. The way to see a flying bullet is to get a little to one side of the shooter, about five feet away from him, say. Then run an imaginary line from the muzzle of his gun to the target. Let your eyes rest on a space of light colored ground exactly on this line, and when he fires you will see something dark, like a bee, dip past the light colored space. That is the bullet. Of course by the time the eye tells the brain it sees the missile the bullet has struck the target, but you have seen it all right."
