Encouragement of Agriculture.

We were pleased to see an article in the Journal, yesterday morning, in which "A Friend of Agriculture" has completely vindicated the constitutionality of the Act supplemental to the Act for the encouragement of Agriculture, which will be one of the most valuable and popular laws ever published in Ohio; the same having been unanimously decided by the County Societies, and petitioned for by the State Board of Agriculture.—Statesman.

NEW USE FOR GUTTA PERCHA.—The editor of the Cleveland Plain Dealer has been shown by the inventor, Mr. Bascom, a specimen of Gutta Percha tape. He says that Mr. B. has taken type and cuts from his paper, and in a very few minutes given duplicates of the same, stereotyped in a composition the main ingredient of which is Gutta Percha, and which gives a fine impression and is said to be more durable than metal itself. The expense is very trifling, and it is destined to revolutionize the Sterotyping System.

TRUANT LAW.—By a law of Massachusetts, the authorities of towns and cities are empowered to arrest and punish all boys who absent themselves from school and spend their time in idleness about the street and elsewhere. The law works well, and wherever it has been executed the results are beneficial to truant boys and to society. Boston is divided into three districts under this law, and an officer is appointed in each to look after vagrant children. In September, October and November, three officers arrested 625 truant children, who were dealt with according to their desert by the Courts. Confined truants, of whom there were 191, were sent to the House of Reformation, School of Reform, or Farm Schools, others to Charity Schools or to the Alms-House. The majority of the young offenders were induced to attend school punctually. The decrease of crime among the juvenile population, it is believed, will be one of the excellent results of this system.

A Young Indian Girl Convicted of Larceny.

Annie R. Cooper, an Indian girl, has been convicted on two indictments for the larceny of a gold watch and a dagger-repousse likeness in Philadelphia. It appears from the evidence that she has been in the practice of pilfering articles from the houses where she was engaged as seamstress, a portion of which she made presents of to certain ladies of the city. Being a young woman of good education, and of considerable intelligence, she corresponded with the wife of the Rev. Mr. Clarke, who conducts a religious magazine, and represented herself as a southern girl, giving her name as Annie Greyson. Some of these letters were exhibited in court, and while they show the prisoner to be a well-educated and strong-minded woman, they at the same time prove the gross deception she has practiced.

To carry on her deception she stole a daguerreotype of the daughter of Mr. Lewis Lyons, and sent it to Mrs. Clarke as the picture of "Annie Greyson," her assumed name. She got another daguerreotype of two children of a Mr. Hart, and sent it also as members of the Greyson family. She introduced religious topics into her letters, which she enlarged upon with much ability and apparent sincerity. It came out on the examination that she has written for Godley's Magazine and others of equal celebrity.

Her counsel, Wm. E. Lehman, declined defending her in the second case. She assumed her own defense, and though the testimony was direct against her, she made a most ingenious and able one. Her address to the jury, says the Sun, was marked by a great command of language, intensity of feeling, and a depth of thought. The effect of her eloquence and chasteness of language was visible in the countenances of her jurors, and Mr. Mann, for the prosecution found it necessary to make a second speech against her.—Ex.

NEW TREATMENT OF WOOL.—There is a new composition for preparing wool for manufacturing purposes, invented by William S. Hubbell and Amos Barrett, of Ashtabula county, Ohio, who have taken measures to secure a patent therefor. In the common way of treating wool for manufacturing purpose, it is washed before it is fit for combing, and after being dried is treated with some unctuous agent, such as oil of various sorts, to render it fit for manufacture.—By this new process the previous washing is not required, as the composition itself acts upon the greasy glutinous matter in the wool, and renders it afterward much more suitable for manufacturing purposes than wool that has been treated in the ordinary way.

A country-woman was carrying on a very simple process against a neighbor in one of the small courts of Germany. The attorney of the opponent pestered her with so much chicanery and legal subtleties, that she lost all patience, and interrupted him thus: "My Lord, the case is simply this:—I bespoke of my carpet-maker, a carpet, which was to be as handsome as my lord the judge, and he wants now to force me to take one with horrible caricatures, uglier even than his attorney. Was I not right in breaking off the bargain?"

The court laughed at the comparison, the attorney was stupefied, and the woman won her suit.
