COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

On Tuesday night the honorable council of the Village of Logan met in regular session, and Clerk Grove entertained his hearers about one-half hour with reading records of the preceding meetings, much to the joy of himself and of those present. All of the plans and specifications and ordinances and resolutions in the matter of street paving must be spread upon the minutes of the council, and as there is much paving on at present, the clerk is earning his salary. Under head of reports of officers, Mayor Thurness made the following report of moneys collected by him during the month of April: Fines \$8.00, meats .60, scale money \$17.00, license \$18.00, making a total of \$33.60. City Treasurer G. W. Pullen made his monthly report of the balances in the various funds April 30. General Fund.....\$3,997.60 Safety Fund.....2,706.62 Service Fund.....3,195.16 Health Fund.....952.37 Water Fund.....2,473.83 Library Fund.....532.86 Water Work Impd.....5,000.00 Sinking Fund.....10,040.97 Total.....\$30,908.41 Both reports were received and ordered placed on file. Under the head of petitions and memorials, Rev. J. C. McLaughlin presented a petition signed by a majority of the property holders abutting on a certain alley in east Logan between the streets of Culver and Orchard at the extreme north. There was one dispute arose as to the width of the alley that was proposed to be paved and the matter was referred to the Engineer and the City Solicitor to straighten out and prepare plans and specifications for the work as petitioned for. This alley has been gone over by a majority of the council, and they are familiar with the fact that the city drain, because of the hill, over flows this alley and floods the property abutting, and that something must be done, and that paving will probably solve the problem for all time to come. The alley will be paved. Mr. J. A. Geiger petitioned the Council for a drainlayer's license, and in looking up the ordinance concerning such license, it was found that it did not specify any time for the ceasing of licenses, and the matter of license to Mr. Geiger was laid on the table and the city solicitor was instructed to draw an ordinance covering the point and present same at the next meeting. Warren, feed.....2.20 Logan Light and Power Co.....367.50 Logan Clay Product Co.....6.00 Gus Shively, burying dogs.....4.50 The bill of Ed Radebaugh was held up because of the \$13.00 back pay that he claimed and the extra \$5.00 that the water works board charged Radebaugh for water. That board formerly charged the city \$10.00 for water and raised it to \$15.00, and the town contracted last year to re-emburse Radebaugh for his cost of the water, but refused to stand the raise. The bill was laid over until the next meeting and the Solicitor instructed to draw up a contract between the Village and Radebaugh. The printing committee was instructed to have a few hundred street paving specifications printed. There seems to be a hitch in the street numbering. It was first estimated that the price of numbering would fall under the \$500 mark and save the town the expense of issuing bonds, but it comes to pass that the whole job will cost in a sum to exceed the amount mentioned, and to avoid bond issue, the contract will again be let in separate parts, viz., the house numbering and the street

OIL AND GAS TALK

The Green Valley Oil and Gas Co. located a well Friday on the Williams farm. The Koehensparger well is two feet in the oil sand, with prospects of a strong well. The Alberta well at Junction City, has filled one tank and the second has seventeen inches of oil. The gas from the Holliday company's well has been sold for drilling purposes and the company is realizing \$125 a day from it. Holders of Overland stock are elating over the big well as it is not more than twenty feet from the Bertha Burns farm which the Overland company has leased. The Reed-Demetros Oil and Gas company of Steubenville, was incorporated Monday with a capital stock of \$8,000 by Frank Demetros, R. N. Morrison, S. B. Reed, J. S. Edmonds and John Shultz. The work on the "joint well" of the three Logan companies, located on the Bending farm, is progressing nicely, having drilled into Berea sand and gotten a good flow of gas. They are going on down looking for the oil sand. The Hocking Oil and Gas company are pushing along with their well on the Phillips farm near Union Furnace. The derrick and rigging are erected and the string of tools are on the ground. The work of drilling will begin at once. The South Perry correspondence says the Hartsough well is reported to be down about 1500 feet. At this time work is progressing very satisfactorily so far, with a depth of about 500 feet. A pocket of gas was struck and later struck oil which is said to be a 6 barrel producer. This however was cased off and they are going on toward the big sand when better things are expected. The Provident Oil and Gas company of Lancaster, was incorporated Tuesday with a capital stock of \$75,000. The incorporators are J. M. Morrison and Clinton Howell of Lancaster, C. R. Ellis of Sabina, H. C. Tulleys of Bainbridge, C. Luttrell of Blanchester, and M. J. Sullivan of Marion. All are prominent in their respective communities and Mr. Ellis is president of the bank at Sabina. The Zion Oil and Natural Gas company of Lancaster, was incorporated last Tuesday by Judge Reeves, Judge Kiefaber and Sheriff Detsbaugh, of Lancaster, and Reed Bigley and E. W. Peoples, of Pomeroy, with a capital stock of \$75,000, elected the following directors at a meeting in Pomeroy, Thursday: Judge J. G. Reeves, Judge A. B. Kiefaber, Sheriff E. R. Detsbaugh and Albert Martens of Lancaster, and C. E. Peoples, M. H. Jenkinson and J. H. Ewing of Pomeroy. The directors organized by electing Peoples president. Martens vice president, Kiefaber secretary, Detsbaugh treasurer, and Jenkinson general manager. The company has leases on 4,000 acres in Meigs county and expects to procure 2,000 more. The name is taken from the old Zion church and school house which stand in the center of one block of leases. The Alberta company struck a gusher Friday night on the L. D. Griggs lot in the west side of Junction City, that is said to be good for a hundred barrels daily on a conservative estimate. It was down 25 feet in the sand at noon Saturday and the hole was filled with 1,700 or 1,800 feet of oil. Electric lights were put on the derrick Friday night in order that drilling could be continued throughout the night, as a strong flow of gas was found and open lights were considered dangerous. The sand was struck at a depth of 2,850 feet. This well has caused great excitement throughout the neighborhood and holders of the stock are jubilant and refuse all offers for stock. The well is within the corporate limits of Junction City and the unleased town lots are being leased already. This strike following so closely that of the Pike company has renewed the activity and excitement so prevalent a few weeks back.

COMMON PLEAS COURT

The case of J. W. Schaal vs The Board of Education of Washington Township was set down for hearing on May 5, but was reassigned to May 21. Case of State of Ohio vs Charles Chamberlain for assault, that was set down for May 7, was reassigned to May 27. Case of State of Ohio vs Ed Lenord for selling liquor in local option territory was assigned for May 6 and reassigned to May 25. State of Ohio vs John Cavine, for burglary, was heard on Thursday of last week on motion to quash the indictment. Motion sustained, and defendant bound over to court in sum of \$500.00, to await the next grand jury. The case of A. R. McBroom vs James Hansen was tried on Thursday of last week, and the plaintiff got a judgement of \$32.50. On Thursday of last week the case of J. C. Huls vs G. W. Shuck was tried and the jury rendered a verdict for \$3.15 in favor of the plaintiff, and the court dissolved the garnishee, and threw the cost of that proceeding onto the plaintiff. The divorce case of Bertha M. Richmond vs Earl Richmond was heard on Thursday of last week, and a decree was granted to the plaintiff and she was restored to her maiden name, Bertha M. Heselden. The case of George W. Dupler vs The Central Silica Co. was tried on Saturday of last week. It comes up out of the petition alledging the pollution of a stream. The case was to the court and was warmly contested and the court rendered decision in favor of defendant, taxing the costs up to plaintiff. Some of the new cases that are on the docket are as follows: Tildon Thorne vs J. M. Helm et al for \$12,000.00 damage and to set aside a deed, claiming illegal purchase. The case comes up out of Waid township concerning the sale of some coal lands of considerable value. One of the new cases entered is that of Ethel Wolfe and Nida Myers vs John E. Lohr and John Bright. This grows out of the transaction of John Bright selling his Avenue property to John Lohr, and now comes forward Brights daughters by his first wife and claim an interest in the property. The matter of the will of J. C. Beal, deceased, came up on appeal from the Probate court. Monday and Tuesday were occupied in the common pleas court with the case of the State of Ohio vs Arthur Mullenree, colored, for shooting with intent to kill or wound. The case was hotly contested and lasted the full two days, the jury rendering a verdict on Tuesday evening for assault; they eliminated the intent, thus dropping the offense from a felony down to a misdemeanor. The case grew out of a transaction that happened out at the races last summer. Mullenree got to betting at the race track, and Bundy Allen was stake holder. The race is said to have gone against the colored fellow and he was very angry and demanded his money. He followed Allen into town and while the later was sitting in his feed store on the Avenue, Mullenree came to the door of the store and again demanded his money, at which Allen replied that he was willing to give him the money back, if the other parties in the bet were willing. With that Mullenree pulled a revolver and fired at Allen and then ran. The ball went wide of the mark and did no harm, but the State could not let such actions go unnoticed, and he was indicted for shooting with intent to kill or wound. He was later sentenced to pay \$80 costs and confined in the workhouse 4 months. The firing of a gun at a citizen is a very serious matter. Mullenree got the felony part of the consequences by making it strong that the pistol was accidentally discharged, however the ball came uncomfortably near Allen. S. S. Rubie Recovering. We are glad to inform the many friends of Mr. Sam Rubie, that Dr. E. E. Campbell reports him getting along nicely at Grant Hospital in Columbus. It was certainly a race for his life, as Dr. Campbell realized his serious condition with appendicitis, took him in all haste to the hospital. The operation was successful and his recovery is now assured.

Conductor W. E. Klenn spent Sunday in Athens, the guest of his sister. Engineer C. M. Chase laid off Saturday and Engineer Willege took his place. Electrician Hall, of the Car Shops, is wiring the Depot for electric lighting. Mr. Ed Lay, chief dispatcher of the whole system, was a visitor at the main office in Columbus, Monday. The north bound train was late Tuesday morning on account of the Wallace Circus train holding it up at Athens. Mr. Bob Smith and wife, off the T. & O. C., living at Columbus, was in Logan the past few days, called here by the death of his brother, Art Smith. The railroad boys are enthusiastic in the candidacy of Conductor John Elder for the appointment to the office of Internal Revenue Collector of this district. His endorsement is certainly one to be proud of, and has commanded the attention of President Taft and of the Ohio Senators, that spells "take notice." The Hocking Valley station at Hooker was burglarized Sunday night while Telegrapher Tenny was out closing a switch. He was away from the building about ten minutes, and on his return found that a burglar had crawled in at an open window and opened the money drawer with a hatchet.
