Common Pleas Court.

The argument of counsel and the charge of court in the Shriner case consumed Friday of last week, and Saturday morning, the jury retiring to their deliberations about 10 o'clock, and at 1 o'clock returned a verdict of "manslaughter," and the defendant was remanded to jail to await the application for a new trial and the sentence of the court. The law on conviction of manslaughter carries with it a penalty of from one to twenty years in the penitentiary.

On Wednesday of this week the court took up and overruled the motion for new trial in the Shriner case, and sentenced the defendant to five years in the penitentiary.

Also the will case of Joshua A. Beal, deceased of Ward Township, was heard, coming up on appeal from the Probate Court. Court sustain will.

The matter of allowance to J. C. Brown, receiver of the People's Store Co., was heard Wednesday, and the receiver allowed \$275.00 for his services.

The case of the State of Ohio vs Ed Leonard for selling liquor in local option territory was tried Wednesday and the defendant found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$150.00 and costs.
