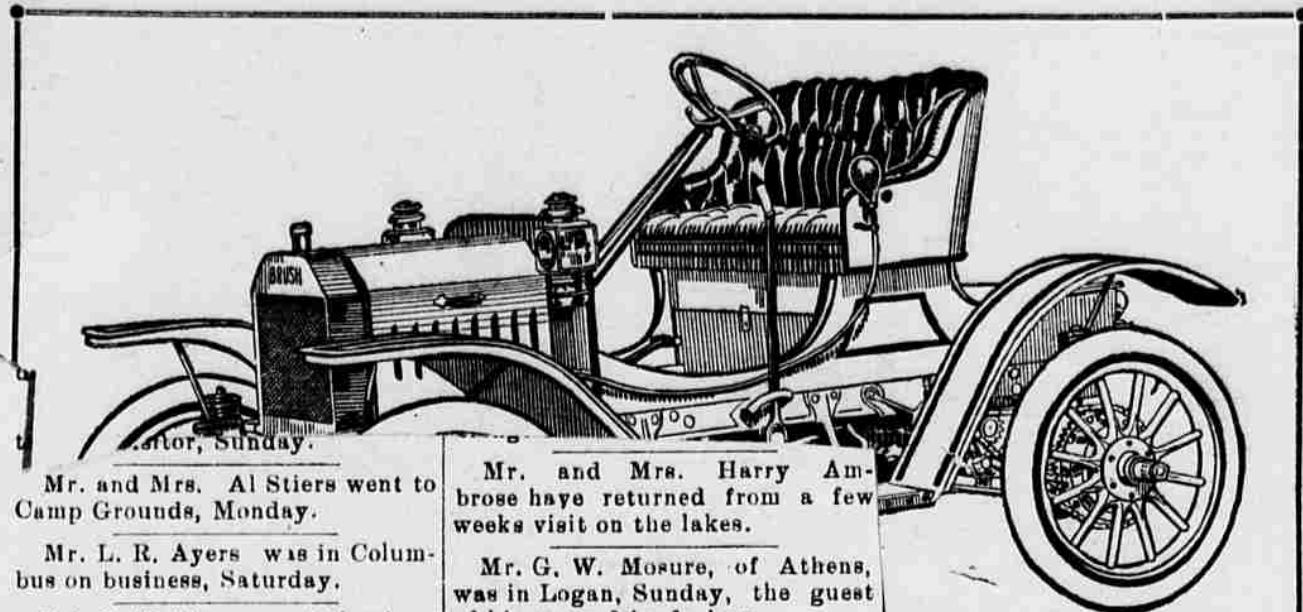

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KILLED BY LIGHTNING

On Thursday afternoon, during the heavy storm that visited this part of the county, lightning struck the coal shed at Antioch school house about four miles from Logan, and killed one Italian and seriously shocked eleven. When the storm came up the men took refuge from the rain in the coal shed near the school house and the lightning struck a tree that overhanged the shed and plowed its way down through the roof and floored the whole bunch of foreigners. All but three of the injured were soon able to walk and were helped to the camp, and the three most seriously injured were taken to the Cherrington Hospital in Logan, and at this writing are recovering.

The Italian camp contains about 300 men and they are laying the big 18 inch gas pipe from Sugar Grove to Charleston, W. Va., a distance of 81 miles. The camp is now situated near the Scotts Creek Church, south of Logan.

LOGAN LANDS FIRST GAME

Amid the stirring music of the Logan band and the cheering of a large enthusiastic crowd the game between H. V. Columbus shop team and H. V. Logan shop team, was started off. The members of the opposing team and quite a number of fans gathered on Main street and were escorted to Welty field by the band. Logan took the field and game was called at 3:20 p. m. The score:

Frank Jackson Killed

Frank Jackson, married, a farmer, aged about 48 years, was run down and killed Thursday evening about 6 o'clock near Rockbridge, not far from his home, by the Hocking Valley Lancaster yard engine and caboose, Chas. Mock, engineer, and Gene Baus, fireman.

Jackson was walking between the two tracks going north from the village where he had exchanged blackberries for groceries, which he was carrying home.

He was hard of hearing and when he heard the train coming behind him close by he stepped onto the northbound track thinking no doubt that the train was on the other track as the northbound track has not been used along there for several months until yesterday, and he stepped in front of the engine and was run over before the engine could be stopped, although it was stopped within thirty feet after he stepped on the track.

He was badly mangled and only living a few seconds after being picked up.

Fire at a Residence.

On Wednesday afternoon, the home of Mrs. Ellen Armstrong, on the South side of Worthington Park, was discovered on fire, and the alarm was turned in, but by the aid of buckets the neighbors had extinguished the flames before the department arrived. The fire caught from a gas stove sitting too near the wall, and burning through, set fire to the contents of a wardrobe and burned the inside to a char. The damage to the rooms by smoke and water is considerable.
