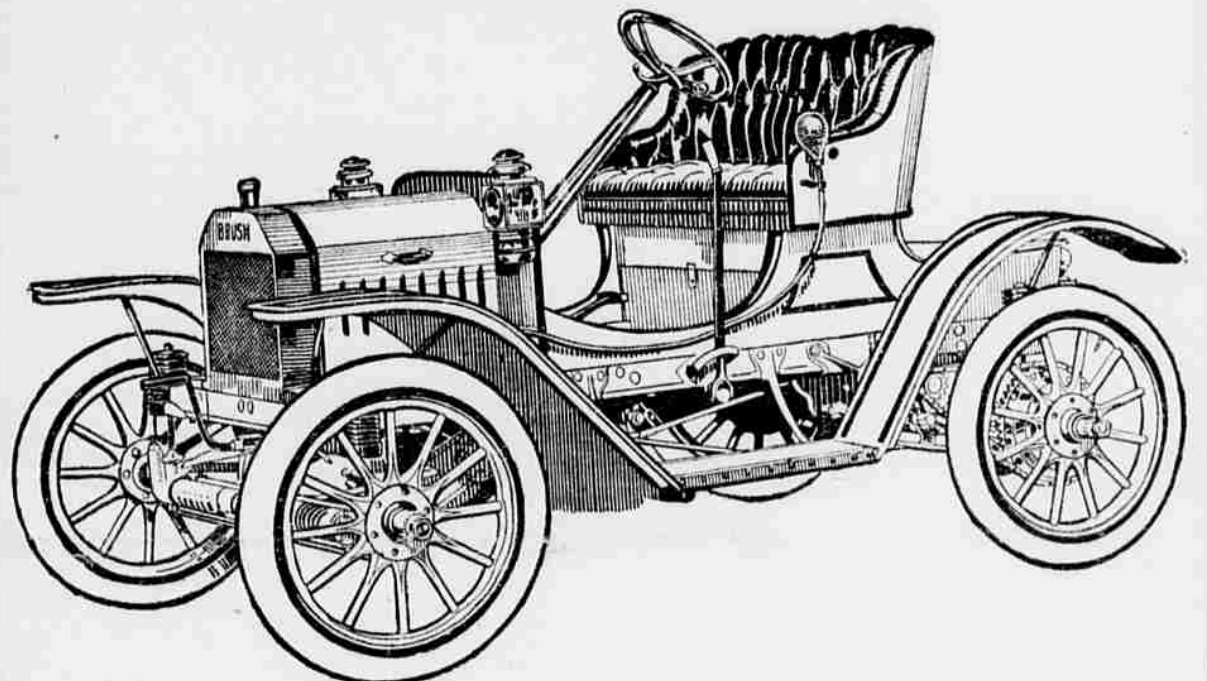
Death of P. J. Goodlive

Two Dominant Parties.

Columbus, Ohio, August 18.—None but Republicans and Democrats may participate in the coming municipal primary in September. This is the opinion of Secretary of State Carmi A. Thompson as head of the election machinery of Ohio, rendered to Prosecuting Attorney H. C. Pugh, of Muskingum County.

The question was raised by the inquiry of Mr. Pugh as to whether political parties which had not cast 10 per cent of the total vote at the last election might take part in the primary. In support of his negative view the Secretary says:

"It is true the law provides for parties casting 10 per cent of the vote and is silent on parties casting less than ten per cent. A general principle of law is that the public funds can be spent only under the provisions of a specific statute or to carry out the specific provisions of a statute. Now, this statute is specific and definite. It says 'those parties casting 10 per cent of the vote.'"

There Are No Republicans in Douglas' Town.

Chillicothe, Ohio August 18.—Mayor Wallace D. Yaple, who has for four terms served this city as Chief Executive, now has been nominated for a fifth term without any opposition.

For the first time in the history of the Republican party, it has failed to nominate a city ticket, all of the principal offices now being held by Democrats, being vacant.
