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## ARREST BURNS FOR SLAYING OF HIS WIFE

**Man Admits He Was In The Woods Just Before The Nude Body Was Found**

**Confronted With A Photograph Of Woman As She Lay In a Painesville Morgue**

CLEVELAND, Oct. 26—Henry J. Burns was booked on a charge of murder here today, charged with the brutal killing of his wife, whose mutilated body was found almost nude in a shallow grave in the woods seven miles west of Painesville, late yesterday afternoon.

Burns admits he was in the woods, but denies all knowledge of the crime. Just before the murder charge was placed against him, he was confronted with a photograph of his wife, Mrs. Hazel Burns, 29, taken as she lay in the morgue at Painesville, her face crushed and torn, her nose broken, and her right eye marked by a bullet hole.

The prisoner shrank back in his chair and cried out, "My God! I wish I was where she is now."

Burns admitted, the police say, that their marital life had been turbulent for the past few months.

## BROTHER OF FORMER KING UNDER ARREST

## STAGGERING FIGURES ON THE STATE'S USE OF GASOLINE

From the annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, it is observed that the state highway department of Ohio spent for gasoline alone the sum of \$229,737 in 84 of the counties of the state, four not yet reporting.

If 25 cents a gallon was paid for the gasoline, the sum expended would have procured 914,938 gallons of gasoline.

If an average of 10 miles to the gallon prevailed, the state highway department must have traveled, during the year, 9,149,480 miles.

If five days were given to state work each week, 260 days represents the actual time machines were in operation.

The above number of days divided into the total number of miles traveled by the machines shows that 31,306 miles were traveled on the average each of the 260 days, which makes the distance traveled (if traveled by one machine) equal to one and one-fourth times around the earth.

Besides during the year the machines of the state highway department must have traveled in distance 366 times around the earth, or from east to west across Ohio it would mean 43,569 trips, and from north to south it would require 41,588 trips to cover the distance required to consume the gasoline used.

In addition thereto the amount expended for auto and truck parts was \$226,558.

As stated above, there are four counties not reporting in the fiscal report published in the Ohio State Journal of Oct. 24, 1922.

The disturbance of activities because of unavoidable detours made necessary because of road building of the highway department probably lessened travel considerably by the paid employees of the state of Ohio under the administration of Governor Harry L. Davis, Republican.

## Michigan Wets Will Campaign In Ohio

DETROIT, Oct. 26—Fourteen Michigan men will be among the 200 or more volunteers from other states that are to invade Ohio as speakers in behalf of the beer amendment, the local branch of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment announced today. The Michigan delegation has been assigned to the theatres, to clubs and labor and social meetings.

## RED ARMY NOW CONTROL TOWN

**American Gunboat Nearby to Protect The Lives Of The Foreigners**

TOKIO, Oct. 26—Troops of the Red army, representing the far eastern republic of Siberia were in complete possession of Vladivostok today.

The last of the Japanese soldiers evacuated the city yesterday after having handed over to the Reds an inventory of the arms left behind them.

An American gunboat, British and French cruisers and a Japanese warship remain in the harbor to protect foreigners until the Chita forces have taken over the administration and restored order.

## W. P. G. HARDING GOING TO CUBA

## TARIFF RATES MAY BE CHANGED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26—Investigation to determine the necessity for changes in tariff rates as provided under the so-called flexible provisions of the new tariff law may be made by the tariff commission on its own initiative under rules of procedure made public today by the committee.

This not only applies in cases of Section 316, dealing with unfair methods in the importation of goods, but also of Section 315, which provides for an increase or decrease as much as 50 per cent in the rates as fixed by congress.

## COURT RULES THAT "BABIES" WERE REALLY DOLLS



One of the weirdest tales ever unfolded in an American court was told in Hammond, Ind., where Frank McNally, fifty-five, charged his twenty-six-year-old wife, Mrs. Hazel McNally, with the murder of their "twins." Mrs. McNally declared in rebuttal that she

was so anxious to be a father he made her "nurse" two dolls. In this she was supported by Mrs. Gertrude Azzato, who said she was a childhood friend of Mrs. McNally and that she did the same trick when she was sixteen. However, Mrs. Floyd McNally, daughter-in-law of McNally, testified

the "dolls" were really babies, as did Katherine Griffiths, daughter of the nurse who attended Mrs. McNally. The court, however, ruled the "babies" were dolls and freed her. She went immediately to a toy store and bought two more dolls, with which she is pictured here.

## U. S. INVITED TO PEACE PARLEY

## COOPERATION IS ASSURED IRISH

**Andrew Bonar Law So Declares In Manifesto Issued This Afternoon**

LONDON, Oct. 26—Andrew Bonar Law, as leader of the Unionist party, in a manifesto issued this afternoon, declared one of the tasks of that party, if it is returned to power, would be to make good the Anglo-Irish treaty and to co-operate with the Irish government.

The manifesto declares it will be the aim of the government, if returned to power, to give its wholeheartedness and practical support to the League of Nations and to fulfill the obligations Great Britain has undertaken abroad and to maintain friendship and a good understanding with the United States.

## CHORUS GIRL TO FACE TESTIMONY

Mrs. Caafee is the only eye-witness to the killing, it is said, and gave testimony to the grand jury which indicted Mrs. Phillips.

## Tobin Is Mentioned as Greek Envoy

## MAN IS KILLED; ANOTHER MAY DIE

## OBJECTION IS MADE TO PLAN

## BONAR LAW IS CHOSEN CANDIDATE

GLASGOW, Oct. 26—Prime Minister Bonar Law was unanimously adopted today as the Conservative and Unionist candidate for parliament from the central division of Glasgow. A resolution of confidence in him was passed.

In discussing his policy, he told a meeting of west Scotland Unionists today: "My strong belief is that this nation needs, above everything else, rest and tranquility, and my policy will be a negative one in this sense."

## MONEY NOT FOUND IN KRAUS HOME

**Sum Of \$150,000 Not Found In Wall Where Mrs. Kraus Said It Was Hidden**

POMEROY, Oct. 26—Thorough search of the Kraus home here today by county officials failed to reveal any trace of the \$150,000 in cash which Mrs. Susan Kraus, the financial Nemesis of many Meigs county folks, had reported was hidden there.

They went to the county jail, got Mrs. Kraus and her husband and returned to the house to continue the search.

Mrs. Kraus led the party to a secret hole in the cellar. The hole was empty.

"Oh, my God! The money is gone, and what won't happen next!" Mrs. Kraus is said to have exclaimed.

## CAPTAINS TO BE REDUCED

COLUMBUS, Oct. 26—According to an order received from Washington at headquarters of the Fifth army corps, 716 captains in the United States army are to be reduced in grade to the rank of first lieutenant. The reductions will be made as of October 3.

## Preacher Is Enjoined From Entering Church

YOUNGSTOWN, Oct. 26—Rev. Octavian Muresan, who recently was charged with embezzling funds from a Warren church, has been enjoined from entering the Roumanian Greek Orthodox Church of the Holy Trinity here, from conducting services there, and from removing any of the sacred articles.

Suit was brought by members of the congregation, who charged that Rev. Muresan had never shown any credentials, and had written a "false and misleading" letter to the archbishop charging that the Protestant churches were trying to win his congregation from him.

## NEW PARLIAMENT MEETS NOV. 20TH

**Proclamation Is Issued By King George Of England Today**

LONDON, Oct. 26—A proclamation dissolving parliament was signed by King George today at a privy council held at the royal estate. The proclamation will be gazetted this afternoon.

The proclamation fixed Nov. 29 as the date for the new parliament to assemble. The king also signed a proclamation calling the Scottish peers to meet on Nov. 16 to elect 18 representative peers of Scotland to serve in the new parliament.

## ENGLAND MAY BUILD SHIPS

LONDON, Oct. 26—The admiralty stated today, on high authority, that an order has been issued for the construction of two 35,000-ton battleships in accordance with the Washington agreement, but there is much discussion as to whether Great Britain will build the ships.

## REPUBLICANS RAISED STATE TAX IS CHARGE MADE BY DEMOCRATS

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 26—Carmi A. Thompson, Republican candidate for governor, was accused of "splitting hairs, submerging facts and twisting truths" by Democratic state headquarters yesterday, replying to the Thompson charge that Vic Donahey, Democratic gubernatorial nominee, tried in a speech at Celina to deceive the public on the question of state levy increases.

Thompson declared Donahey had attributed to the Davis administration an increase from .45 of a mill to 4.175 mills. Democratic headquarters insisted Donahey has been saying Republicans did it between 1918 and 1922. Its statement in part follows: "It is true the increase in the state tax rate began during the last term of Governor Cox, but it was done by a Republican general assembly, elected in November of 1918, when Governor Cox was the only candidate elected on the Democratic ticket. ## PRINCIPALS IN DOUBLE MURDER MUST TESTIFY

**Called Together This Afternoon By Prosecutor For A Questioning**

**Mrs. Gibson Says She Can Identify The Man Who Shot The Rector**

NEW BRUNSWICK, Oct. 26—Mrs. Jane Gibson, pig raiser, who claims to have witnessed the murder of Rev. Edward W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills, today told newspaper men that she had identified the man who says shot the rector, as well as identifying the woman who she says was the murderer.

Mrs. Gibson, who was on the Phillips farm the night of the murder looking for corn thieves, said that she recently had recognized the slayer in the prosecutor's office here. She said today that she had also recognized the woman at the scene of the murder.

Judge Mott, the special prosecutor sent to New Brunswick, today called every principal in the case so that he might hear their stories.

Mrs. Hall, widow of the rector, James Mills, husband of the slain woman, Charlotte Mills, their daughter, Henry and William Stevens, brothers of Mrs. Hall, and Mrs. Gibson all will be questioned.

After a conference with his detective, Prosecutor Mott told newspaper men this afternoon that he could make an arrest at once, but that he preferred to wait a more opportune time. Mr. Mott said that because of certain information reaching him this afternoon, the conference called with the principals in the case had been called off.

## FASCISTI WANT TO BE IN POWER

ROME, Oct. 26—The heads of the Fascisti have called together all the military leaders of that organization and at the same time has ordered all the military sections of the Fascisti to keep in readiness the 800,000 workers who have joined the organization in order to co-operate in an organization movement with the military section. This is said to mean that preparation is being made for the assumption of power by the Fascisti.

## REPUBLICANS RAISED STATE TAX IS CHARGE MADE BY DEMOCRATS

It was vetoed by Governor Cox, but the Republican general assembly passed the increased rate over his veto.

"The general assembly came back in 1920 without being called by the governor and without the approval of the executive again raised the state tax rate from .65 of one mill to one mill to 3.30 mills.

"The Republican general assembly was succeeded in 1921 by the present legislature, with a still larger Republican majority and it has not been annoyed by the vetoes of a Democratic governor, for Harry L. Davis succeeded Governor Cox. Beginning with December, 1922, collection of taxes the state rate, as levied by the present general assembly, will be 4.175 mills. The taxpayer, who was required by the Democratic general assembly in 1918 to pay \$4.50 will, the coming year, be required by the present Republican general assembly to pay on the same property taxes amounting to \$41.75."
