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FASCISTI AND COMMUNISTS IN BIG CLASH

Rioting Reported To Have Occurred In Various Parts of Rome

One Person Killed, Another Wounded; Fascisti Are Taken Prisoner

ROME, Oct. 29, 8:15 p. m.—Serious rioting broke out here tonight. Members of the Fascisti, while passing through the workmen's quarters, were attacked by the Communists, who threw stones and fired revolvers. The Fascisti replied.

One person was killed and one Fascisti wounded and the Fascisti, who were greatly outnumbered, had two other members of their party taken prisoner.

Reinforcements of Fascisti in motor cars went to the rescue of their companions. Troops meanwhile occupied the zone with an overwhelming number of soldiers.

DRY SPEAKER HAS LARGE AUDIENCE

Gifford Gordon Speaks At The Church of Christ On Sunday Evening

Quite a large congregation was present at the Vine street Church of Christ Sunday evening to hear a "dry" address given by Gifford Gordon of Australia, a representative of the Victorian Anti-Saloon League. Some of the Protestant churches of the city suspended their services Sunday evening to permit their congregations to attend the union service.

An appeal for pledges and subscriptions to support the dry cause in Knox county was presented by P. S. Keiser, dry manager.

Mr. Gordon spoke at length on the subject, "Hold Fast America," making an appeal for the continuation of prohibition in the United States.

American Woman May Become Duchess

Fascisti Leader Is Ready To Form New Italian Cabinet

ROME, Oct. 30—Benito Mussolini, leader of the Fascisti, called by King Victor Emmanuel to form a new cabinet, arrived here today.

Crowds at the railway station gave him an enthusiastic welcome.

Mussolini left at once for the quirinal, where he was given an audience by the king.

It is said the new ministry will be constituted in the course of the day. Mussolini declared the Fascisti "must go into power without alliances with any other party, but the granting of some portfolios must go outside the Fascisti party."

In forming a new cabinet, Mussolini said he would retain to himself the portfolio of interior and foreign affairs, appoint General Diaz minister of war, Admiral Di Reval minister of finance, and include in the body the Catholic deputy, Cavazzoni, and the Liberal senator, Lusignol, conferring the other portfolios upon Fascisti.

TRIO GO TO JAIL; CANNOT PAY FINES

Young Men Before Mayor Keigley For Fighting On Sunday Evening

Carey Eagle, Fred Hess and P. Wolfe were before Mayor Keigley in police court Monday morning on a charge of assault made by Ralph Rush. Pleas of guilty were made by all three and each was given a fine of \$10 and the costs. In default of payment they were committed to the county jail.

The arraignment of the trio is the result of an affray on South Main street before the Smoke House cigar store Sunday evening. It is claimed that one of the three was in a quarrelsome mood. He attacked Rush slapping him. The others joined in the affray tearing Rush's coat.

The affair is said to have extended over quite a period of time. When it first started it was interrupted by one of the local police officers who dispersed the disputants. After the officer left the quarrel was renewed and Sheriff Lytle was called. He placed Wolfe, Eagle and Hess under arrest taking them to the county jail. Later they were released with instructions to report Monday morning.

When the three were taken to the jail after their appearance before the mayor they left word that should their parents come and pay their fines tender of the money should be refused.

STATE RESTS IN A MURDER CASE

How many witnesses the defense plans to call has not been revealed.

GRAIN FUTURES ACT WILL BE TESTED

CHICAGO, Oct. 30—The Chicago Board of Trade today made its first move to test the constitutionality of the grain futures act when it filed in federal district court here a petition for an injunction restraining the government from enforcing the provisions of the act, which was passed to become effective Nov. 1.

The bill of complaint charges that the law seeks to regulate interstate commerce trade that which is wholly state; that it interferes with state rights to govern; that it seeks to deprive board members of property by admitting representatives of competitive bodies and permitting them to receive commissions in violation of rules observed by other members.

Fear of what might result from the drastic provisions of the law, the complaint said, might bring on "serious disturbances" of the grain markets of the country. District Judge Carpenter issued a stay order preventing enforcement of the act until Nov. 13, when he will hear the petition for a temporary restraining injunction against the enforcement of the regulating act.

Formation Of A Republic Sought By A Resolution

STONE WITHHOLDS HIS STATEMENT

Wants Full Text Before Commenting Upon 'Living Wage' Attack

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30—The assertion that "a living wage is something that every person should have to live" was the only comment Warren S. Stone, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, would make today on the attack of the public and railroad groups of the railroad labor board on the theory of "living wage" as a basis for determining the pay of railroad workers.

Stone, who was a caller at the White House, said he wanted to see the full text of the announcement, made public last night in Chicago, before entering into a discussion of the position the two groups had taken.

TWO DEAD; 35 ARE HURT IN ACCIDENTS

Cleveland Reports Many Traffic Accidents; Gov. Davis To Take Action

CLEVELAND, Oct. 30—Two boys and a man were dead today and 35 persons were under medical care, several of them in a serious condition, as a result of yesterday's traffic accidents in Cleveland, marking the most serious traffic accident period of the year.

As a result of the increasing seriousness of the traffic conditions, Governor Davis, who spent Sunday in Cleveland, declared today he would ask Attorney General Price to call a meeting of the Ohio law directors to draft a model traffic ordinance for uniform regulations for the larger cities.

Candidate On The Republican Ticket Violates Crabbe Law

COL. COLE SPEAKS TO FAIR AUDIENCE

Republicans Fail Completely To Fill Court Room Saturday Evening

Col. Ralph D. Cole of Findlay addressed Knox county Republicans at the court house Saturday evening. While the number that heard him was larger than was at the Thompson-Less meeting or any other the Republican party has held here in this campaign it still leaves somewhat to be desired.

In demonstration it may be said that the seating capacity of the court room was not nearly exhausted. The main floor, including the space within the bar, was filled with a small overflow into the gallery. The latter was by no means crowded or even filled. While the meeting was by much the best the Republicans yet have held in this county it nevertheless gives evidence of a continued apathy and indifference on the part of the voters that in the minds of the party leaders seems to spell impending wreck and disaster at the coming election.

Col. Cole made a good speech. He did that unquestionably. He is able, he is impressive and has a manner of delivery that carries, for the moment, conviction. He is one of those able and talented men who are able to make a poor and indifferent cause appear attractive or even like a winner.

That Col. Cole, moreover is popular in Knox county was further reason for his speaking assignment here. Two years ago at the Republican gubernatorial primary he carried Knox county against Gov. Davis. It was good politics to send Col. Cole here.

As for his speech, it would not be right, fair nor correct to describe it as of the usual spellbinding sort. It was not, for Col. Cole does not have to and does not make that sort. It was a good speech to listen to. He is a master of diction, his English is faultless, his voice is pleasant and flexible, yet sufficiently deep to be impressive.

After speaking some pleasant words of thanks and appreciation for the support of Knox county Republicans given two years ago, Col. Cole praised the state ticket with particular reference to Col. Thompson and Congressman Fess, and with passing and incidental reference to the county ticket. The style and quality of his in reference to Thompson. "The Reprising is illustrated in what he said publicans never have nominated a man better equipped for the governorship than Col. Thompson."

Thereafter he discussed national questions describing what has been done by the Republican national administration and with what difficulty because of the "dreadful way" in which things had been left by the inefficient Democrats. He could hardly repress a feeling of surprise, not, as the country is doing because so little has been done, but rather that anything has been done at all.

It was a good "Stand By" speech, the voters not being permitted to forget the duty they owe to their president who is a citizen of this state. While defending the national administration Col. Cole mentioned very briefly the performance of Congress. Rather, he "damned it with faint praise."

DEVELOPMENTS IN SLAYING OF TWO MINISTERS

Mother Says Her Daughter Did Not Murder The Rev. Leonard Christler

More Witnesses Are Found In The Hall-Mills Double Murder Case

HAVRE, Mont., Oct. 30—While Mrs. Christler today was on an eastbound train accompanying the body of her slain husband, Rev. Leonard J. Christler, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church and known as "the bishop of all outdoors," Mrs. Joseph Pyle, mother of Mrs. Margaret Carlton, whose body was found beside the slain rector, is attempting to prove that her daughter did not commit murder and suicide.

"I do not believe Margaret did it," said Mrs. Pyle shortly after her arrival here. "I shall not be satisfied until I find who owned the gun."

Her reference was to a .33 calibre revolver in the hand of Mrs. Carlton when the body was found. A small .22 calibre revolver, which she always carried, was found in Mrs. Carlton's handbag. That Mrs. Carlton had an infatuation for the rector is admitted by Mrs. Pyle.

THE HALL-MILLS CASE

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Oct. 30—Possibility that the Hall-Mills murder case would be presented to the grand jury today seemed remote this morning.

Information from Somerville, county seat, was to the effect that notices had not been forwarded to members of the grand jury.

Special Deputy Attorney General W. A. Mott today reiterated his confidence in the story told by Mrs. James Gibson, woman farmer, that she witnessed the murder.

Two witnesses, Mr. and Mrs. N. R. Tingle, who live near the Phillips farm, have corroborated Mrs. Gibson's story insofar as the hour of the murder is concerned. The Tingles heard sounds which they believe were pistol shots at 10 p. m. the night Rev. Edward W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills were shot.
