LOAN COMPANIES HAD A PROSPEROUS YEAR

Figures Given Out By State Supt. Of Building And Loan Association

Despite the so-called hard times of the past twelve months, building and loan associations in Knox county have shown a gain in assets of \$276,823.99, according to figures just announced by State Superintendent of Building & Loan Associations, John W. Prugh.

In speaking of the record made by building and loan associations of this county during the last year, Mr. Prugh said that they have demonstrated their worth to their respective communities in a very material way, inasmuch as progress was made at a time when losses were being shown in many other lines of endeavor. He said that despite the smaller incomes of the people of this community they have become more thrifty and were saving more money per dollar earned than they did during the prosperous days of war times.

The gains made in this county, according to Mr. Prugh, indicate that there is less money being invested in securities of doubtful value and that more money is being placed in local financial institutions of recognized safety.

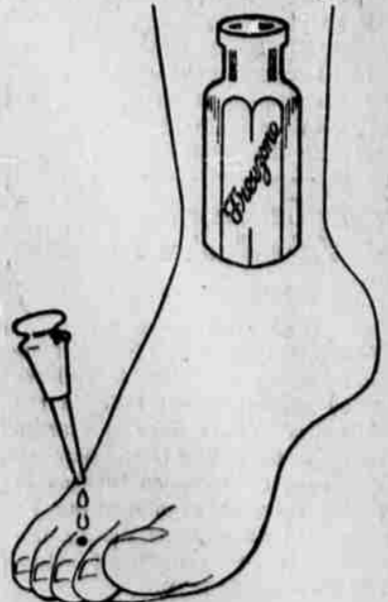
The four building and loan associations in Knox county now have assets of \$3,825,436.49, as against \$3,548,607.50 a year ago.
