WHAT THEY ARE SAYING ABOUT THE TANGLES.

The Governor of Oregon Makes a Statement.

Oregon.

National Associated Press to the Star. SALEM, OREGON, Dec. 8.—The proceedings at the meeting of Electors was as follows: All the Republican and Democratic Electors assembled in the room of the Senate Chamber. The Secretary of State passed an envelope through the door to Cronin, who read it as a certificate of the vote given to Odell, Cartwright and himself. He then put it in his pocket, refusing to show it to the Republicans. Odell, Cartwright and Cronin seated themselves at a table and organized by electing Odell Chairman. Watts offered to leave the room, but as the other Democrats (Kilpelt and Laswell) refused to leave, he remained at the request of the other Republicans. Watts then tendered his resignation as Elector. Odell and Cartwright severally demanded their certificates of Cronin, who repeatedly refused to surrender them. After some time Cronin asked if they refused to act with him, Odell and Cartwright said no, very emphatically, but demanded that their authority to act should be shown. Cronin then left the table, the Republican Electors having made no objection to co-operate with him, and after calling in Miller and Parker, organized his Electoral College as before reported. Secretary Chadwick claims to have simply acted under Governor Grover's orders.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The Commercial Advertiser's special says that the Democrats claim that the irregularity in Oregon will bring the whole question of fraud in the Electoral College before Congress, and that Cronin, the Democratic Elector, has a prima facie case, and that the Republicans must accept the vote or go behind it, which would give the House the right to inquire into and exclude the vote of Louisiana.

The Governor Makes a Statement.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The Herald publishes a dispatch from Governor Grover, of Oregon, giving the grounds of his action in granting certificates to the Electors in Oregon. He says, in reference to the case of Watts, that the fact of his disqualification was well known. A protest was entered against the issuance of a certificate to Watts. To this a reply was filed objecting to anything but a count of the votes and certificates on the count, making no denial of the disqualifying facts. It was ruled in the case that the Governor had a right to determine the question. It was also held that the votes cast for an ineligible candidate can not be counted for any purpose, and the eligible candidate having the next highest number of votes was duly elected. This ruling he says was based upon standard authorities, such as Cushing and Grant, the decisions of many courts, the later uniform practice in the U. S. House of Representatives, and the great weight of English authorities. The law of Oregon providing for filling vacancies in the Electoral College recognizes a vacancy only in cases where there has been an incumbent and such incumbent has died, refused to act, neglected to attend, or is otherwise absent. In this case there was no incumbent, unless the next highest candidate should take the position, and there was no vacancy, which could be filled by the other members of the College. The next highest candidate eligible under the Constitution of the United States was therefore entitled to be duly elected.

South Carolina.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Dec. 8.—Governor Chamberlain took the oath of office as Governor, in the State-house before Probate Judge Boone, a joint resolution repealing the law that the oath should be taken before the Chief Justice or Associate Justice having been passed previously. The inauguration was over before it was known in the city, and only parties admitted by the authorities witnessed the ceremony. A company of troops were stationed in the lower corridor, and constabulary guarded the entrances. The ceremony over, Governor Chamberlain delivered his inaugural.

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 8.—General Wade Hampton has issued the following card:

The following paragraph appears in the address of D. H. Chamberlain delivered in the Capitol to-day:

"The gentleman who was my opponent for this office in the late election has recently declared, as I am credibly informed, that he holds not only the peace of this city and State, but my life in his hand. I don't doubt the truth of his statement. Neither the public peace nor the life of any man who now opposes the consummation of this policy of fraud and violence is safe from the assaults of those who have enforced that policy."

I pronounce this statement infamously false. I, by my renewed exertions, have endeavored to preserve the peace of this State, and I have thus contributed to shield from popular indignation one who has proved himself a disgrace to his rank and a traitor to his trust. His conscience may make him tremble, but neither I nor the men with whom I act, countenance the hand of the assassin.

FROM THE NATIONAL CAPITAL

To-day's Congressional Business.

National Associated Press to the Star. WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The House Judiciary Committee had a meeting this morning and agreed to report the resolution introduced in the House yesterday by Mr. McCreary, of Iowa, providing for a committee of five members to act with any similar committee that may be appointed by the Senate; to prepare and report without delay such a measure, either legislative or constitutional, as may in their judgment be best calculated to accomplish the end, that the Electoral votes may be counted, and the result be declared by a tribunal whose authority none can question, and whose decision all will accept as final.

The subject of the status of Colorado was informally discussed, but final action was deferred until Monday, in order to allow Mr. Keott to look up precedents and prepare an opinion in the case.
