"What baby?" asked Meier, and she said, "Pat Mulvaney?" and then went to the bureau and took out the white handed knife, now in Court, and said this is what killed the man, having previously told Meier that Donahue Mulvaney gave the knife to her, saying, "Take it, Belle, and keep it for what it has done." "I thought the knife from her for \$2.50. Next morning one of the girls wanted to get the knife back, and Jennie Marks said, "Belle, you will get in trouble, for you have betrayed Pat."

Barney Kahn, a German laborer, who lives at No. 10 Augusta street, was found about 5 o'clock this morning on the pavement, in front of his house, in an unconscious condition, and bleeding from a wound in the head. An ambulance was procured, and the man sent to the Cincinnati Hospital, where he received medical attention. When he was restored to consciousness he told the physicians his story. He had gotten up in his sleep about 3 o'clock in the morning, and then opening the window in the third-story quietly walked out. He was unable to get up after his fall, and soon fainted. He has a severe scalp wound on the back of his head and his ankles are badly swollen. The doctors were unable to state whether they were broken. The man's injuries are not fatal, and this morning he was resting easy.

Mr. Bramlage requested Dr. Muscroft's attendance in order to give his version of the affair, as he is thought to be in a dying condition. He says that the accident was the fault of the driver, as he had been wined and dined and again to cease his reckless driving. He also states that when he was lying in the creek he asked the driver's assistance, but was told to help himself and get out as best he could. Mr. Bramlage's testimony will be taken down on paper and sent to the coroner. The man is not expected to outlive the day, and is now lying at his home on Fifth street, near Wood.

Events finally show his innocence unmistakably, and prove as conclusively the guilt of those who entrapped and persecuted him, and the denouement both vindicates and avenges him." The idea of witty humor and devotion is strongly brought out and enforced, and this congenial character it can easily be imagined Mrs. Chanfrau can do herself through justice and win new admirers in this highly pleasing expression of her art.
