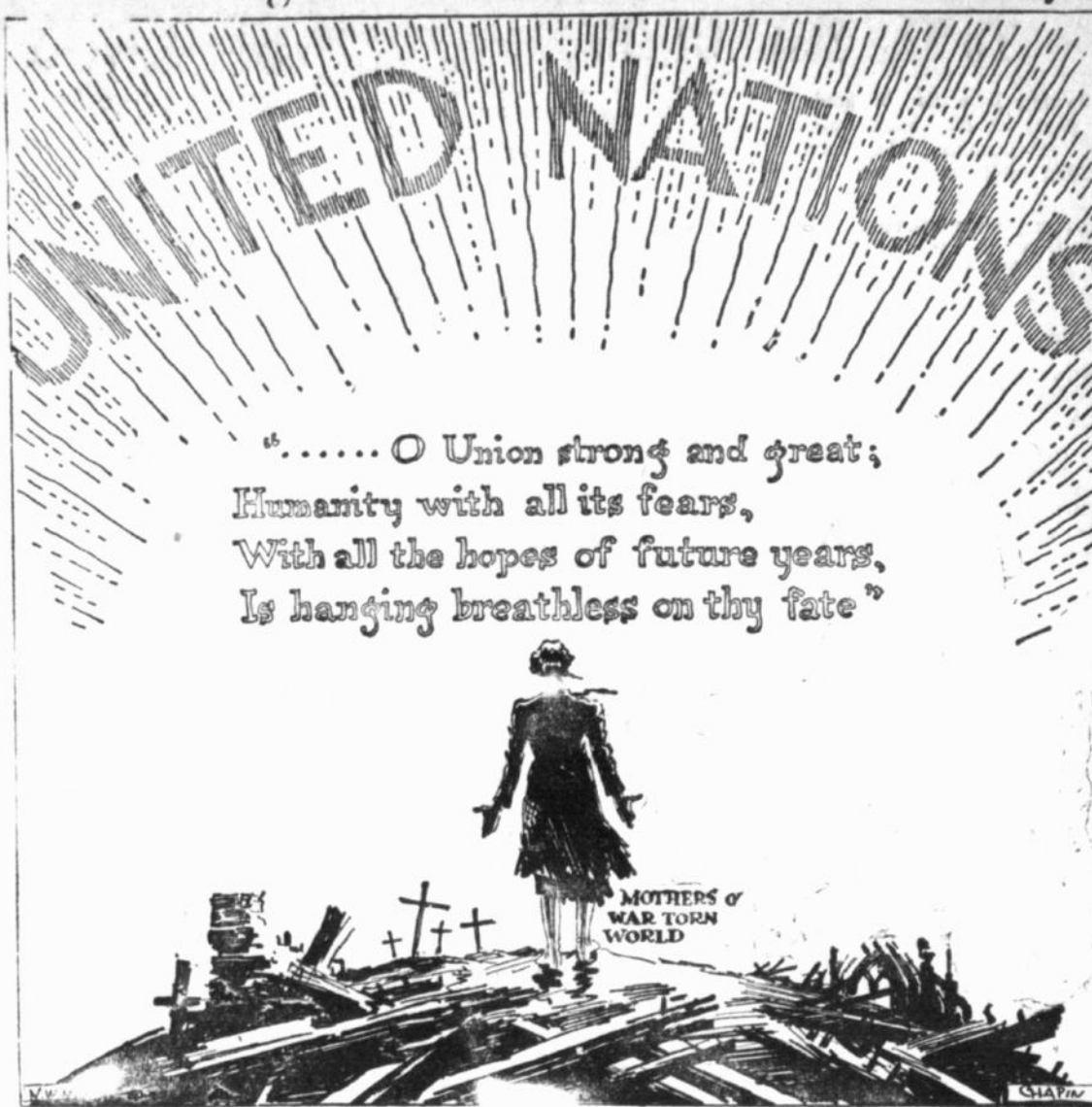
KIRCHNERS have started work on cleaning out the interior of the old Lyric theatre and ere summer is over we may see a new business established therein.
