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OFF FORT PILLOW

The enemy all ways responds with shot and shell, giving us two for one. We have not been damaged yet. The rebels have been reinforced by four new gunboats.

THE CHARGE OF COWARDICE

The Columbus Journal of the 17th, has the following in regard to the charge of cowardice against certain O. R. Regiments: We were favored last evening with a conversation with Lieut. L. Starling Sullivan, of this city, who has just returned from the battle field at Pittsburg Landing.

THE WALLS SHIVERED AT EACH CHARGE

The walls shivered at each charge and fell, or leaped in shattered fragments in the air. The breach was almost wide enough for a storming party to enter, when the three-barred flag, which had once previously been shot down, was suddenly lowered, and a white one went up. Our firing ceased and the gunners had time to rest and cheer.

THE KILLED AND WOUNDED AT PITTSBURG

The Pittsburg correspondent of the Chicago Times writes, on the 20th. The work of burial is complete, and the returns show over six thousand and killed, of whom four thousand and four hundred were rebels. It is difficult to account for this, but the rebel dead are undoubtedly double our own number.

EXPENSE OF A SIEGE

EXPENSE OF A SIEGE.—A siege is an expensive business, as the U. S. Treasury will understand by the time Yorktown and the other fortifications on the road to Richmond are taken. It is stated that in the siege of Sebastopol the allies employed 2,587 guns for which were served 2,381,842 shot and shells, and 11,484,908 pounds of powder, exclusive of what was used by fleets on the day when they assisted in the bombardment.
