Confer With Local Erie Employees.

**SOME RADICAL CHANGES**

Contemplated for This Division of the Road.

An Aggressive Campaign for Fast Freight Service will be Taken up at Once.

A party of Erie officials stopped in this city Saturday morning as they were passing over the lines on a tour of inspection. They were for some time in consultation with the local officials and it is said that they are planning some radical changes for this division of the road. As a number of changes have already been undertaken any new plan of the officials will not come as a surprise. The officials of the road are in favor of running the trains with more accuracy than in the past as they think that less disasters will occur if this is perfected and they are trying. It is said to remedy this defect as the lateness of Erie trains has become a joke among all railroaders. The replacing of a number of very valuable employees who were discharged during the recent financial trouble, is also being considered by the officials.  
 The dispatch work on the Big Four road on the Marion and Bellefontaine division will hereafter be done at Bellefontaine instead of Galion. The change takes effect January 12.
