During the Administration of President Washington, Congress passed a crimes act, which was approved and placed upon the statute books of the United States, April 30, 1790.

The first section of this statute provides that—

"If any person, or persons, owing allegiance to the United States of America, shall levy war against them, or shall adhere to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort, within the United States of America, and I pulled the Company.
