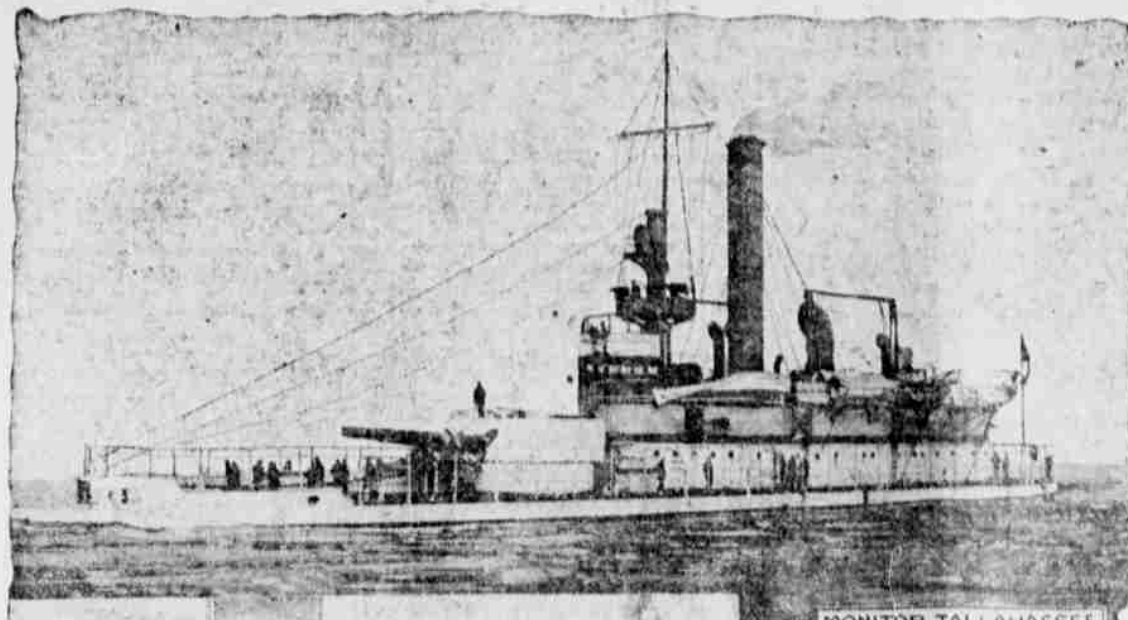

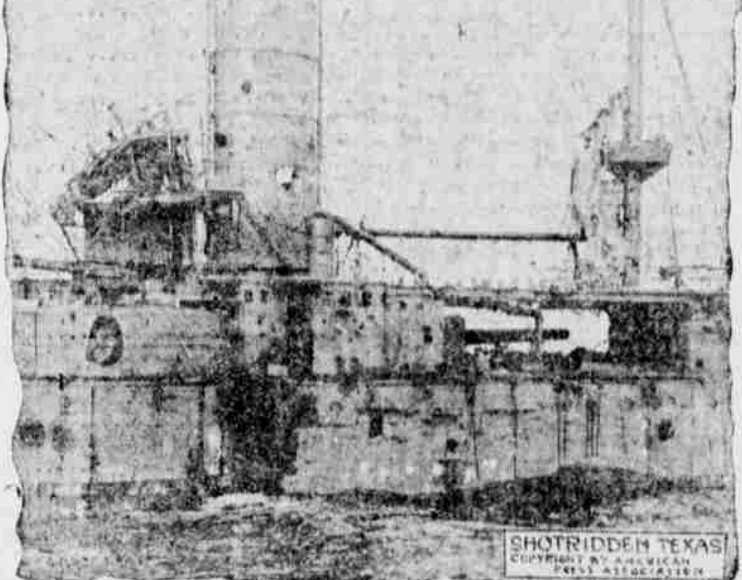

SHOTRIDDEN TEXAS

Washington, April 13.—Shattered and shot ridden already in the interest of naval progress, the poor old battleship San Marcos, in the days of her glory called the Texas, is to undergo another ordeal April 19 in Chesapeake Bay, when the monitor Tallahassee, formerly the Florida, will bombard her with twelve inch guns from varying ranges. The old ship is to serve once more and probably for the last time as a target for "range practice" to obtain technical data for the navy department. The San Marcos now lies in the mid of the bay as the result of the bombardment she received from the battleship New Hampshire some weeks ago. It is expected that after the Tallahassee's exercise with the San Marcos the old ship will go to the junk heap. It is interesting to recall that this vessel as the battleship Texas took a prominent part in the great naval battle off Santiago in 1898.

STATE BOARD CALLS TEACHERS BEFORE IT

LOUIS KISH BRINGS SUIT AGAINST AUTOMOBILE OWNER—INJURED AT TULSA.

Sapulpa, Okla., April 13.—Claiming that his injuries sustained when an automobile in which he was riding went off the Arkansas River bridge at Tulsa a few weeks ago, were caused by negligence and carelessness of the driver and owner, J. P. Riggs, Louis Kish this afternoon filed suit for \$1,500 damages against Riggs in the district court.

Kish was injured when an automobile in which he was riding, together with Riggs and two little boys went off the wagon bridge and plunged to the water 32 feet below.

THOMAS CHISHOLM, FORMER EASTBOURNE GOLFKEEPER TO SUPERVISE LINKS.

He was acknowledged to be one of the greatest golfers in the world and was the English society teacher.

He is considered by many the most successful teacher living and this affords the club and its friends a rare opportunity.

GOVERNOR CRUCE PLACES THEM ON HIS MILITARY STAFF YESTERDAY.

Stafford and William Black of Oklahoma City. Representative Jesse Gillespie was appointed a Colonel and C. J. Wrightsmen a Lieutenant Colonel on the staff.

Will Build New High School.

Sapulpa, Okla., April 13.—Determined to let no grass grow under their feet in their efforts to supply another high school for this city, the school board this afternoon issued a call for an election to vote on the proposition of floating \$40,000 worth of school bonds with which to erect the building.

The plans of the school board at this time include the building of a \$75,000 high school building to be ready for occupancy next fall.

supplies for military purposes with Mexico, we are entitled to know what these negotiations are. Congress, is however, without any information or evidence on the subject. This country would not ordinarily be entitled to know the secret treaties or alliances that other countries make, but on the part of Mexico, we would unquestionably be entitled to an explanation." He added that he had no fear that history repeat itself or that any government would attempt to imitate the example of Napoleon III, who through false pretenses, and subterfuges sent an Australian Archduke to a Mexican throne simply to abandon him afterwards to despair and death." He was confident that Japan does not seek war with the United States and declare, there could be no cause for hostilities between the two countries.

Discrediting the report that Japan might desire to take surreptitious possession of the island of Guam, a cable station, he declared that if such was the purpose it could not be justified by international law. He found in Guam usefulness only as a cable base and, speaking sarcastically of the island, said:

"Guam is a charming spot and one of the most lustrous and brilliant jewels in our oriental galaxy. Its principal products are vipers, snakes, lizards, wild cats, rats, and castor oil, and if the island were put up at auction today, with all of the inhabitants in it, beyond its value as a military post, it would not bring a dollar and a half in any of the markets of the world."

Much of the Maryland senator's speech was devoted to the contention that the Monroe doctrine is not involved in the Mexican situation. Quoting authorities to show that the original Monroeism looked only to the prevention of the establishments of new monarchical institutions in the Western hemisphere, he sought to discredit the position in relation to the collection of claims against Western Nations taken during the Roosevelt administration in the Santo Domingo controversy. This he characterized as the "Roosevelt doctrine" rather than the Monroe doctrine. He said in part:

"Let us look for a moment at what sort of wars we would have if the Roosevelt construction of the Monroe doctrine was to prevail and was to be incorporated into our diplomatic code, we would have an interminable succession of bondholders and stock market wars. War instead of being declared by Congress, could be practically declared by the banking syndicate of London, Paris, Amsterdam, and Berlin, represented by their financial agents in America and we would become sponsors and guarantors for every bankrupt and impoverished government in Central and South America. We have never been informed as to what amount of money was made out of the Santo Domingo settlement nor what was the price at which their bonds were sold before our intervention and what was the price that the holders afterwards obtained for them in settlement of their claims, nor who was in the real, nor who were the beneficiaries of our interference."

"I will not sit here in silence, with folded arms and permit this revolutionary principle which was formulated and promulgated overnight by Mr. Roosevelt to be known by any other name except the name of the illustrious individual who first conceived it and put it into practical execution. I want to lift this cloud from around the brow of the rising generation."

Speaking of the President, Mr. Rayner expressed satisfaction that "what ever he does will not only be necessary and proper, but, in his opinion, will be for the best interests of the country."
