FIVE HUNDRED COMING TO MEET IN TULSA FOUR DAYS NEXT WEEK.

An Immense Amount of Business to Be Transacted in Four Days—The Full Program.

They are coming. The Odd Fellows are already crowding in for the Grand Lodge and Encampment meetings in this city next week.

FOR SCHOOL LAND TEST.

DEPOT SUIT COMPROMISED

FRISCO WILL NOW GO AHEAD WITH PASSENGER STATION.

PRESENT SITE ADOPTED

Structure Will Be Erected Between Main and Boston with Tracks South of Building.

It is stated on reliable authority that the injunction suit which has delayed the building of the Frisco passenger station in this city for a long time, has been compromised, and that work will commence on the new structure within a very short time. The depot will be built between Main and Boston streets, on the present site. Thirty feet of the Boston street crossing is to be left open for the use of the public, and all the tracks of the company will be laid on the south side of the depot.

The new Frisco passenger station in Tulsa, according to the plans, will be the finest in the territory, and will be built at an approximate cost of \$50,000. It will be a credit to the city and to the company.

STATES AGAINST THE DEMANDS

Trustee of Big Devlin Coal Mines Issues Manifesto.

Topeka, Kas., April 7.—J. E. Hurley, general manager of the Santa Fe, and one of the trustees of the Devlin estate, issued a statement today against granting the demands of the miners, which is of unusual importance, as he speaks for one of the largest consumers as well as one of the largest producers of coal in the Southwest.

The statement says: "It is regretted that there are disturbed relations between the operators and the miners, and that there may be a necessity of managing the mines with other men. The demands made by the miners would mean, as I compute it, a net increase of approximately thirty per cent per ton in the cost of mining."

The statement reviews the conditions prevailing in the Devlin mines and says that they are operated at a loss.

EIGHTEEN PER CENT SIGNED.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 7.—Eighteen per cent of the total tonnage of Indiana have signed up the nineteen-three scale as the result of the first week of the strike. The miners claim to be satisfied with the progress made.

REFINERY WORK PROGRESSING

Seventy-Five Are Busy Laying Side Track.

C. O. Frye informed the World this morning that the foundations for the stills, and big stack of the refinery were laid and that the grading for the side track was finished.

He further stated that 75 men were hard at work on the track and that at the rate matters were progressing the company would soon be ready for business.

BOTH SIDES ARE PLAYING FOR MORE TIME

NEITHER CAN COMMAND MAJORITY ON RATE BILL.

VOTING TIME UNDECIDED

There Are 55 Active Republicans and 33 Democrats in the Senate—Tillman Gives the Line-Up.

World Washington Bureau. Washington, April 7.—The reason no agreement has been reached in the senate for a vote on the railroad rate bill is that neither side is assured that it has enough votes to win. There are fifty-five active Republicans and thirty-three Democrats. Neither Senator Tillman, the bill's leader, nor the conservatives, headed by Senator Aldrich, are yet satisfied that they command forty-five votes.

Tillman today said: "The president has apparently burned his bridges behind him. He advanced a proposition unacceptable to a majority of his party and has called in the Democrats. We can give him twenty-eight votes for a limited court review amendment, and the suspension of rates pending proceedings in court. Whatever votes are lacking, the president must supply from the Republican ranks."

Crane, speaking for the conservatives, said that 40 Republicans were ready to vote for the broad court review amendment. This means that five Democrat votes are needed. Taking the two statements together the probabilities seem to favor the adoption of the broad court review amendment which embraces cash deposit with the court to cover the difference between the original rate and the commission's rate for the protection of the shipper.

THERE'LL BE NO INDIAN LAND GRABS

GOBBLING OF TERRITORY COAL RIGHTS PREVENTED.

NEITHER SALE NOR LEASE

A Certainty That the President Would Have Vetoed the Bill With the Grabs Still in It.

Washington, April 7.—The conference committee in charge of the five tribes bill agreed upon a provision this afternoon which will prevent the railroads from further extending their control over the coal fields of the Indian Territory. Under this provision no more of the coal lands can be either leased or sold "until such time as may be otherwise provided."

Under the provision of the bill as first reported several railroads were in a position to secure by lease or purchase Indian lands, which Senator LaFollette said are worth 4 billion dollars, for a few millions. LaFollette's estimate of the value of the lands was said by the railway interests to be extravagant.

The action of the committee resulted from the disclosures made in the senate by Senator LaFollette, who exposed the plans of the railroads to acquire the coal lands at a ridiculously low price. The members of the committee were also influenced by information that if the bill as passed contained the provision advocated by the lobbyists of the railroads, President Roosevelt would veto it. With the certainty of defeat ahead, the lobbyists made no serious effort today to have the legislation they desire retained in the bill. It was rejected by the committee practically without discussion.

AVENGING ANGEL OF ZION ROARS DEFIAMCE AT ENEMIES

MILL CREEK FARMERS' UNION.

Mill Creek, I. T., April 7.—The district convention of the Indian Farmers' union for the Twenty-second recording district of the Chickasaw nation concluded its labors here today after a two days' session. At one time it looked as though a permanent rupture would result when nearly one-half of the delegates walked out on the question of a territory organization, they being for territory organization proper. A compromise was finally reached.

THREE MILLION FOR IMPROVING AND DEVELOPING THE MIDLAND VALLEY RAILROAD.

AND EXTENDING THE LINE

From Arkansas City to McPherson, Kansas, and Then Will Go South To Gulf of Mexico.

The Midland Valley Railroad company will keep up with the procession, no matter how fast the pace may be set. As their expansion, extension, and improvements are all directly or indirectly tributary to the welfare of Tulsa, Tulsa citizens will be pleased to hear the following:

Three million dollars has been set apart by the officers and stockholders for the express purpose of extending the line from Arkansas City to McPherson, Kas., there to connect with the Union Pacific. This money has not been borrowed in any way, and it will not be expended for rolling stock. It is for the road bed and other equipment.

This is not all. The company will, as soon as able, turn their faces southward and will carry their line from Fort Smith, Arkansas, to deep water at the Gulf.

Already a large business has been done with Southern points by this road. In April alone, for instance, 1,500 car loads of Texas cattle were brought into the Territory by the Midland Valley, unloaded at Foraker and Myers, dipped into the vats and turned loose on the rich grasses in the Osage country—there to grow fat and get ready for market. These cattle came from Brady, Sandown, Comstock, Sweetwater, Odessa and San Angelo, all in Texas.

There is an immense territory north and south of Tulsa from which the Midland Valley can draw the richest resources and it will not be slow in extending so as to capture all in sight.

THREE DROWNED IN LAKE.

Woman Rocks Launch and Causes It to Capsize.

Grand Rapids, Mich., April 7.—Geo. McDonald, Samuel Callahan and Mrs. George Coop were drowned last night on Lake Huron. The woman rocked the gasoline launch, causing it to capsize. Thomas Delaney saved himself by swimming ashore.

DOWIE IS VERY WRATHY

SHOUTS HIS FURIOUS ANGER AGAINST HIS "DEPOSERS."

Newspaper Man, No Longer "Unclean Devil," Hears Hot Stuff in "Propphet's" Private Car Today.

San Antonio, Texas, April 7.—A Scripps-McRae man rode with Alexander Dowie, the avenging angel of Zion, from the Mexican border to San Antonio this morning. Dowie does not call newspaper men unclean devils now, but welcomes them in his Pullman. As he spoke, his rage mastered him time and time again, and he roared out statements which resounded through the car. He said: "I will drive my wife and my son from the city of God. They are unnatural and possessed of devils. The love of God has died in their hearts. I have been true to every trust placed in me, and to God alone am I accountable, and not to those I placed in stewardship. The charges of extravagance are foul, and the mouthings of a curse. That I taught polygamy is a devil born lie. That I have been guilty of improper relations with youthful proselytes is a slander that the might of a just God will avenge upon the high priests of iniquity who longed for my death. My people have twenty-one million dollars, and the debts of Zion are as a mole to a mountain. The receivership curtailing of my commands their illegal acts, and in the courts, as well as with my hand, I will smite them and lay them low. Women may prove a downfall to the prophets of old, but they can cast no spell upon modern prophets. It is a lie to say that I lost millions in Wall street, a lie which will choke my accusers as their souls depart with the lustful letters purporting to have been written by me, which I will prove by putting their creators behind prison bars."

DOWIE PROMISES A MIRACLE.

The Founder of Zionism in His City Monday Night.

Chicago, April 7.—John Alexander Dowie has announced in a private telegram to one of his deacons that he will return to Zion City late Monday night and "perform a miracle." He promises, among other things, to bring the "faithful in Zion" 10 million dollars in gold and several scrolls of parchment upon which were written the five books of Moses. In the message, which was sent from the City of Mexico, Dowie declared that he is now greater than he ever was believed to be.
