NOW FOR APPEAL

Nelson Has Three Weeks to Appeal to the Supreme Court.

PART OF EVIDENCE.

People who Swear that Morris Said he Would kill Nelson on Sight. "Pat. Dobbins" the invisible.—Defense Claim Error in Handling Jury.

The main contention of the defense in the Nelson murder case, in asking a new trial, was the discovery of new evidence. It introduced many affidavits on this point. Among them, Patrick Dobbins in his affidavit testified substantially that he had on one occasion heard Albert Morris say that he would kill John Nelson on sight and that he saw Morris attack Nelson.

Ferguson Lemon, of Vinita, I. T., also swore that he had heard Morris threaten to kill Nelson at the first opportunity.

George Vann, of Coffeyville, in his affidavit for the defense, testified that he had met Morris in Coffeyville just a few minutes before the killing and that Morris asked him if he had seen Nelson. That Morris further said that he was looking for Nelson and would kill him on sight. Vann had made contradictory statements for the state. To offset this the defense undertook to prove that Vann had been drunk by emissaries of the state before testifying. The court refused to let Vann go on the stand to show this.

The state introduced many affidavits in rebuttal and among them were affidavits from the best people of Nowata showing that no Patrick Dobbins lived near Nowata as claimed.

The defense claimed that error had been committed by the bailiff in the handling of the jury by leaving them alone at times and allowing them to separate. The state introduced the affidavits of eight out of the twelve jurors stating that they had talked to no one and that no one had talked to them during the trial.

The motion for a new trial was overruled and the court suspended sentence on Nelson for three weeks to give the defense time to get the transcripts ready to appeal the case to the supreme court.—Coffeyville Journal.
