

Information of Unusual Nature Found in This "Questionnaire"

(By Reciprocal News Service.)
LONDON, (By Mail)—April 30.—The following questions have been received from newspaper readers in the middle-west.

The answers are based on information received from official sources.

Has England done her share in the war as compared with Scotland, Ireland and the Colonies?
 Up to the beginning of 1918 the British empire had contributed 7,500,000 men in the allied forces of democracy. Out of this total England alone contributed 4,500,000 fighting men, something over 60 per cent of the whole. Scotland came next with 620,000. Wales gave 250,000 and Ireland 170,000. The population of Ireland is about the same as that of Scotland, and one-ninth of that of England and Wales. The personnel of the navy is about 740,000.

Are there any women in the English army?
 The women's army auxiliary corps had enrolled 20,000 women in February, 1918, of whom 6,500 were already abroad and 5,000 under sailing orders. This corps is an official part of the British army.

Women Munition Workers.
 How many women are employed in munition plants in England?
 In January, 1918, there were more than 700,000 women at work on munitions and more than 2,000,000 men as employed.

What is the pay of the British army?
 The minimum pay for privates is 35 cents a day, and the minimum for officers \$250. The average pay of the French private is 5 cents a day when in reserve and 30 cents a day in the fighting line.

What is England's total war debt?
 Mr. Bonar Law's latest estimate is not much under \$30,000,000,000, of which \$3,000,000,000 is for loans to the allies and dominions.

How much has England borrowed from the United States?
 The amount now (April, 1918) is something short of \$1,000,000,000.

What is the weekly ration for civilians in England?
 Civilians are allowed the equivalent of twenty ounces of butcher's meat per week, four ounces of butter or margarine and eight ounces of sugar. In certain districts the rationed maximum being one and one-half ounces a week.

Profiteering Abolished.
 What about food profiteering?
 Profiteering has been practically abolished by government control of prices of nearly all essential food-stuffs, the list including wheat and cereal products, sugar, potatoes, milk, butter, cheese, lard, tallow, lard, meat of all kinds, tea, coffee, jams, jellies, dried fruits and oils.

How many people in England are employed on war work?
 Not counting men and women in uniform, about 5,000,000 persons are engaged directly or indirectly on work for the government.

How many aeroplanes has England?
 In January, 1918, the naval branch of the air service had more than 2,500 planes and a personnel of about 16,000. The military branch had several thousand planes and numbered its personnel by tens of thousands.

How many people are employed at the war office and the admiralty?
 The military staff of the war office is now 2,730 and the civilian staff about 15,000, two-thirds of whom are women. The clerical staff of the Admiralty is about ten thousand.

GERMANS FORBID BELGIAN MINES TO SELL PRODUCT

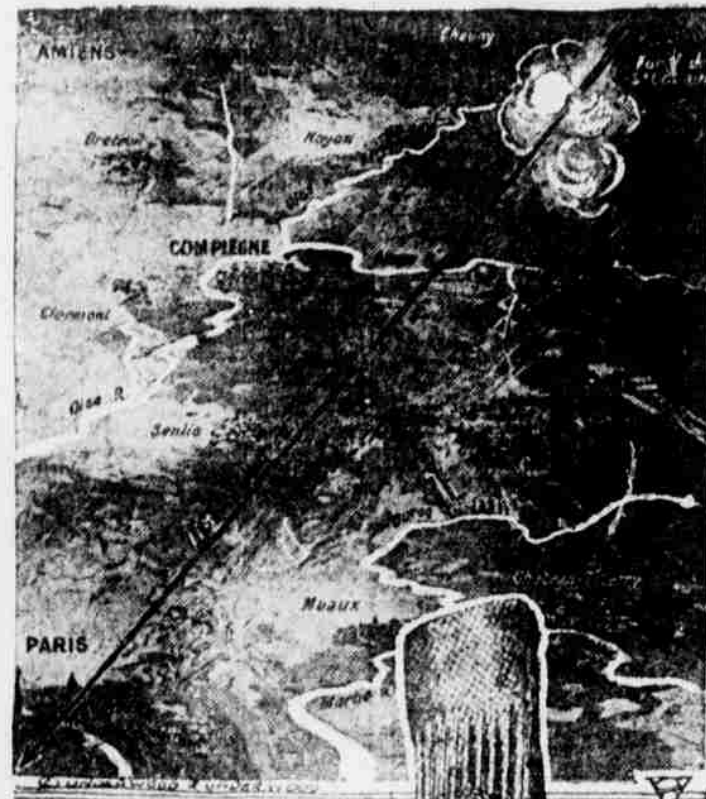
Protest Against Holdings of Huns in Regard to Handling of Coal; Flemish Are Exploited.

BRUXELLES, May 11.—Domestic consumers of coal who are not heeding the admonition of the United States fuel administration to "buy your coal easy," in the mistaken belief that they will be in plenty of time, might feel differently if they realized how sorely afflicted are the people of Belgium for lack of coal.

Through the "liber Belgiques," a little-known sheet published clandestinely in Belgium and sent out by way of Holland, it may be learned how the Belgian coal miners are protesting against the measures adopted by the German occupiers which have brought about a scarcity of coal throughout Belgium. In the first place the coal miners in their protest to the governor general of Belgium admit that their lack of coal is as it is with us, "due in a great measure to the difficulties of transportation," but in addition to this the miners are forbidden to sell coal.

The German administration is the sole dispenser of the product of the mines and of course uses the bulk of it for military needs. By means of the product of the coal mines in Wallonia the Germans are exploiting the Flemish people. As the Belgian miners in their protest say: "Our coals are intended for the entire population, Flemish as well as Walloon, but they must not serve as an instrument of division or of civil discord. In lending our aid to the execution of these orders, we are co-operating in a policy which patriotic duty forbids us to follow."

Big Guns Expensive Toys for Huns

Late dispatches from Paris carry the information that the big German gun that is shelling the French capital from the forest of St. Gobain has done little damage. The shells have little explosive power. The accompanying map shows the character of the country over which the gun's shells pass. It is shown that the actual distance traversed is 116 kilometers, or 71.92 miles. The flight is in a southwesterly direction and the range will require an elevation that will take the projectile eighteen or more miles high at the crest of its trajectory. The shell is 9.5 inches in diameter, and the crest of firing each shot is about \$2,000. Allied airmen are reported to have killed many of the gunners who man this monster cannon.

CAMPAIGN FOR SAVING OF LIVE STOCK IN OKLAHOMA

Over 15,000 Said to Be Slaughtered on Railroads Every Year; Most Killed in Town Limits.

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 11.—The state council of defense has begun an active campaign to prevent needless killing of live stock on railroads. The necessity for such a campaign is shown by the fact that during the past year over 15,000 head of live stock were thus killed. In war time, when every bit of meat is so urgently needed, such a campaign should appeal to the patriotism of everyone.

Over 200 agents have been appointed by the state council of defense to further this campaign in every county. These agents will arouse public opinion, they will try to interest stock owners, editors and influential men in the community. They will also endeavor to have more adequate local ordinances enforced. Most of the stock slaughtered are killed within city and town limits.

Letters have also been sent to 3,500 stock owners of Oklahoma calling their attention to the importance of this effort. The railroads of the state are heartily co-operating in the campaign.

French Sworn In.
BERLIN, Ireland, May 11.—Field Marshal Viscount French was sworn in today as lieutenant and governor-general at a meeting of the Irish privy council. Lieutenant-General Mahon handed over the sword of office which he had held temporarily.

War Camp Community Has Plans for Mail Order Business in Happiness

A gigantic mail order business in human happiness, and especially in the happiness of our fighting men, has been started by the war camp community service of the war and navy department commissions on training camp activities.

This organization is working in 22 cities, 234 towns and 34 villages adjacent to our great camps and cantonments throughout the United States to promote wholesome stimulating and friendly relations between our fighting men and civilians. Its object is to do everything within the power of the communities which it organizes to stimulate the morale and preserve the physical well-being of our soldiers, sailors and marines.

The mail order business consists of postal cards distributed through the general federation of women's clubs, chamber of commerce, merchants' associations and other organized bodies to the relatives of our new soldiers just going into the armies. One of the cards is to be mailed to the war camp community service organizer stationed nearest to the camp where the new soldier is assigned, giving the soldier's name, branch of service and address, and the other is to be mailed to the new soldier giving him the name and address of the community organizer. The latter card reads: "The war camp community service furnishes entertainment for the men spending their off duty time in Danes, theatrical entertainments, sightseeing tours, dinners,

club privileges, information on what to see and where to go are provided. Separate opportunities are offered for officers.

The plan which was originated by the New York war camp community service is still in its infancy. An appeal has been made to the general federation of women's clubs to spread the news of it and to ask mothers, wives, sisters and sweethearts of our soldiers not to wait for the printed cards, but to write immediately to "War Camp Community Service" in the city, town or village nearest the camp, giving the soldier's name, and to their loved ones that they have written to war camp community service.

This will add much to the total of human happiness both of our fighting men and of those who have the pleasure and privilege of entertaining them.
