

## CONVENTION HALL TO HOUSE H. S. EXHIBIT

All Departments of High School Work to be Represented in Public Demonstration.

### WILL CONTINUE THREE DAYS

May 13, 16 and 17 Are to be Days of Real Entertainment For Tulsa Citizens.

The annual exhibit of the Tulsa Central high school will be held at Convention hall May 13, 16 and 17. All of the departments will be represented in this exhibit. It will be the largest exhibit of school work ever held in the city of Tulsa. In the afternoon the music classes will give a concert of selections, the gymnasium pupils will give some of their fancy dances, and some athletic drills, which they have been so diligently practicing.

The manual training department will have one of the largest and most interesting of all the exhibits. Some of the articles which will be exhibited from this department are: Cedar chests, tables, bookshelves, and dining chairs, bed stools, lamp dressing tables, desks and telephone tables. In fact everything from this department which will be of any interest to the people will be exhibited. The beautiful workmanship of the pupils who are taking training will be highly appreciated after it has been viewed by school patrons.

**Art and Science Booths.** The domestic art and science classes will represent their work and food conservation in their display. They are going to have a number of different booths, each representing one phase of the work.

**French and Spanish.** The French and Spanish classes will be represented by a speech in French by Eugene T. Kelly, and the translation by Richard Wheeler. There will also be some French papers on exhibit. The 11B and 11A Latin classes will display some drawings from Cicero, and also they will have some written papers on exhibit.

**Language Booths.** The English classes, which studied Ivanhoe during the present year, will have illustrations from the book, such as pictures of Wamba, Gurth, the Black Knight and Ivanhoe. The English literature classes will have on display compositions showing literary appreciation. The 11A English classes will display their talent in editorial.

The art department will have one of the largest exhibits; it will cover about forty cards. It will consist of a copy of all the work done during the year. Some water color paintings will also be shown. This will be very interesting to all who will attend. The commercial department will display its work in business, English, bookkeeping, penmanship and spelling and vocational guidance. The penmanship, which will be on display is exceptionally good. The vocational guidance class will have on display self-analysis charts made by the pupils.

All classes in the science department will have something on exhibit. The geology classes have mounted fifty minerals, which have been found by the students during the year. There will also be numerous plates of land structure, fault planes, oil field contour and work done in the laboratory by the biology classes. They will have a collection of the different kinds of bugs they have collected and mounted during the year.

In the mathematics department original problems from the geometry classes, which the students have worked out will be shown.

**Embryo Public Speeches.** The public speaking department will be represented by the Bell-Bellows contest, which will be given one evening during the exhibit. The triangular debate of the girls and the boys will also be given.

The gymnasium classes composed of girls will give some of their fancy dances, poses, and some of their athletic drills. The boys will give the tumbling drill, which was given by them in assembly, and which aroused much enthusiasm among the students and will be of great interest to all the people who attend. To this performance will also be added some of their athletic drills.

The music classes will furnish music every night during the exhibit. The first program will be the songs from the allied countries. The next evening they will sing, "Come where the Lilies Bloom." The Mandelsham club will also furnish some of the music. The orchestra will play every night before and after the program.

All the citizens of Tulsa are cordially invited to attend this exhibit and see the excellent work which this high school has done during the present year.

### Spanish News

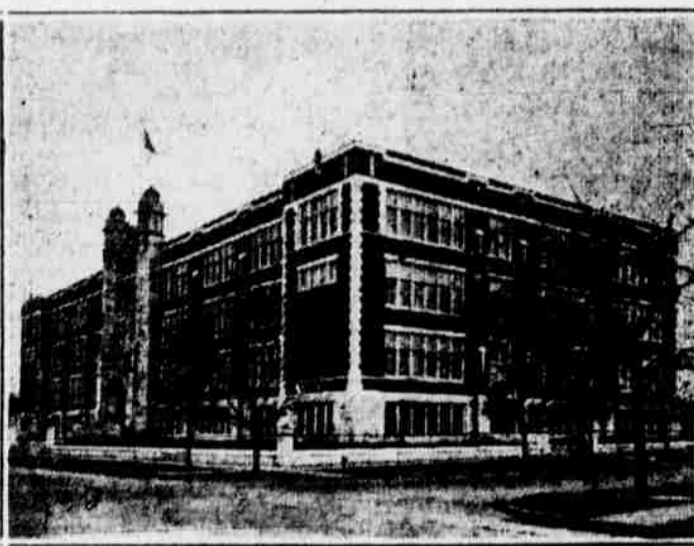
