The first presidential proclamation was issued by President Lincoln in 1863, when he appointed a day for annual thanks offering. All presidents since his time have followed the custom, usually designating the last Thursday in November.

LOONEY TO ENFORCE DRY LAW IN TEXAS: Despite Refusal for Rehearing, Attorney-General Insists State is Still Legally Dry.

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 27.—Notwithstanding the fact that the court of criminal appeals has declared the Texas statutory prohibition law unconstitutional and refused a motion for rehearing today, Attorney-General E. F. Looney declared that the state is still legally "dry" and his department will spare no effort authorized by law to prohibit traffic in intoxicating liquors.

The next legal step to obtain license open to saloon men is to file motion in the supreme court for leave to file petition for mandamus to force the comptroller to issue permits.
