HENRYETTA, Sept. 18.—Rev. Lovick, former law ex-chaplain of the United States army overseas and one of the general evangelists of the Methodist church, has begun a series of revival services here.

MIAMI, Sept. 18.—A military band from Fort Sill has been ordered to the Ottawa county fair September 26. The band will lead the parade of 1,200 Ottawa county soldiers in a hibernation round. The city and county will pay the band's expenses.

PONTOTOC COUNTY IS GROWING NEW CROPS

Many Farmers Leaving the Beaten Rut of All Cotton and Corn for Barley and Clover.

Special to The World. ADA, Sept. 18.—It is said that the man who follows the beaten track may make a living, but he will never get wealthy. Anyway, the farmers of Pontotoc county are leaving the beaten track and striking out into new fields. Some of them are making money at it too, and demonstrating that Oklahoma farmers can grow any crop that will grow south of the snows and north of the tropics.

Barley is becoming a favorite crop with some of the growers. Three years ago there was no land planted to barley in Pontotoc county. This season there were several hundred acres planted in the crop and those who profess to know say the acreage another year will run into the thousands.

The advantage of barley over corn is the fact that it produces from 20 to 60 bushels an acre that will not produce half that much corn. It is much up earlier in spring, is a good food, better for some purposes, as corn, the farmers are getting enthusiastic about it.

Along with barley, clover, small clover, and alfalfa, 2,000 acres were sown in sweet clover in the county last spring. J. P. Hill, the county farm demonstration agent, says that a single classified planter, C. H. Palmer, has sown sweet clover on six acres of sandy soil. Beginning 30 days after the clover was planted he carried 10 cows on the six acres for 60 days. At the end of that time he moved three tons of hay.
