

SENATORS PLAN TRIP TO COAST

Borah and Johnson to Make Reply to Wilson's Claims.

TO MAKE LONG TOUR

Three Weeks' Journey Outlined—Johnson Back at Capital

CLOSE VOTE IS EXPECTED

Crucial Test to Come on Adoption of Johnson Amendment

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Senators Borah and Johnson will leave for the coast today to make a three-week tour of the Pacific coast, according to a dispatch from Washington.

The tour will include a stop at San Francisco, Portland, Seattle, and Vancouver, before returning to the coast.

Senator Johnson will be accompanied by his wife and children, while Senator Borah will travel alone.

The trip is expected to be a long one, as the senators will be making a complete circuit of the Pacific coast.

Both sides admit that the vote on the amendment is almost certain to be close.

The amendment is certain to prove a crucial test of strength between the opponents and proponents of ratification of the treaty without amendment or reservation.

SELF-DETERMINATION IS ASKED FOR HUN PROVINCE

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Germany has sent a note to the peace conference asking for a decision as to the future of the Memel district, formerly a part of the German province of East Prussia, which was detached by the peace treaty, according to a News Agency dispatch from Berlin today.

The note recites that representatives of the population in the Memel district repeatedly requested Germany to bring about a speedy decision regarding their future.

It is declared further that the entire population of the area in question demands the right of self-determination.

PROTEST AT "DUMPING" OF BRITISH WOOL IN AMERICA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Protest that British wool is to be "dumped" on the American market is to be made by western wool growers, according to a telegram read in the senate this afternoon by Senator Phipps of Colorado.

A telegram from W. A. Stryder of Colorado declared that British merchants are planning to export large amounts of wool to the Boston market and others, and that such action will result in a demoralization of the market for American wool growers.

FORM 'HINDENBURG' LINE AROUND FIUME

Italian Troops Prepared to Defend City Says Dispatch Received From Rome By Paris Paper.

PARIS, Sept. 22.—Italian troops sent to conduct a blockade of Fiume have constructed a "Hindenburg line" for seven and one-half miles around the city, supported by blockhouses, machine gun nests and barbed wire entanglements, according to a dispatch to the Journal today from Andre Tudosko, a correspondent.

The "Hindenburg line" is defended by 20,000 Italian troops, but the blockaders are fraternizing freely with Capt. Gabriele D'Annunzio's raiders. General Badoglio, commander of the blockade troops, has established an "armistice line" five miles from the city.

M. Tudosko encountered the military line when he tried to enter Fiume. He reports that no correspondent is permitted to pass into the city without close scrutiny.

Another dispatch from the Fiume district said that D'Annunzio was holding the Italian troops in Fiume to prevent the allies from bombarding.

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Says Wilson Given European Presents Worth One Million

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Senator Penrose, republican of Pennsylvania, declared in the senate today that President Wilson and his party brought back from the Paris peace conference jewels and other gifts from crowned heads worth more than one million dollars.

Interrupting a speech by Senator Ashford, democratic, Arizona, who said that in 1918 it had been proposed to prohibit acceptance of gifts from foreign rulers by the president, Senator Penrose asked if the Arizona senator had in mind gifts made President Wilson while in Europe.

"I know nothing of that," Senator Ashford replied, "but if any democratic accepted such gifts he would receive my condemnation as quickly as if he were a republican."

"TO HELL WITH KINGS" SAYS SOCIALIST MAYOR

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 22.—"I stand for the man who works to hell with the kings," said Mayor Daniel Hoan, socialist, today in reply to the request of A. T. Vanoy, of the chamber of commerce, that King Albert and Queen Elizabeth of Belgium be formally invited to visit Milwaukee during their coming tour of the United States.

"While I have most respect for the Belgians," said the mayor, in a signed statement, "it would be to my everlasting shame if I should contribute one iota to the cause of kings. The time has come when we must line up with the kings and their satellites or with the rights of men."

NO MARINE REPORT COMES, SAYS DANIELS

Secretary of Navy Back at Desk Says He Has No Word of Marines Landing at Fiume.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels, back at his desk after his long trip of inspection to the Pacific coast and Hawaii, said today that the navy department had received no confirmation of the reported landing of a force of marines near Fiume.

The dry dock at Pearl Harbor, Honolulu, is one of the most notable accomplishments of the navy, the secretary said.

Treasury Gives Notification of Counterfeit \$20 Note.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Notice of a new counterfeit \$20 note on the federal reserve bank of New York was given today by the treasury.

The counterfeit note and the background of Cleveland's portrait are solid black, instead of having fine cross lines, and the treasury number are black instead of blue.

RIO GRANDE IS FALLING AFTER RECENT HEAVY-RISE

HOUSTONVILLE, Texas, Sept. 22.—Reports today from the swollen Rio Grande are that the crest passed the town of Hidalgo and the river at that point has fallen somewhat. The crest is expected to reach here within the next 24 hours.

A 14-inch rise was reported during the night near Pharr, Texas, and the water is eight inches higher there than it was during the flood stage of July last. The flat bottoms on both sides of the river which are lower than the banks continue to receive backwaters from depressions in the banks.

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
