

CHICK EVANS EQUALS TULSA GOLF RECORD OVER 9 HOLES

LARGE GALLERY FOLLOWS PLAY

Pass and Collins Beat Evans and Kennedy in 18-Hole Match

EVANS DELIGHTS GALLERY

Wonderful Play and Personality Make Great Hit With Followers

Ideal weather and the participation in play of Charles Chick Evans, former national open and amateur champion, brought out a large gallery at the country club yesterday afternoon when Clifford Pass and Collins beat Evans and Kennedy in the second round of the state's leading amateur and J. G. Collins, Tulsa country club professional, defeated Evans and James A. Kennedy, the latter also one of Oklahoma's leading golfers. Kennedy was clearly off his game, being especially unfortunate in his driving while Collins and Pass played splendid golf, the former turning in a score of 72 for the 18 holes.

"Chick" Evans is a real champion. Every stroke he makes is a masterpiece of grace. With a ready smile and a steady nerve, even when he allowed a drive to the fringe, he never lost his way into the hearts of those who saw the match. Evans equalled the course record of 53 for nine holes in the second round despite his unfamiliarity with the course.

Brilliant shots by all four players and some of the best playing seen in the Tulsa links drew applause from the large gallery throughout the match.

Pass and Collins finished the first round with 74 seven points better than Evans and Kennedy. Kennedy improved in his play in the second round and with Evans played in a game of 73, two points better than that of Collins and Pass.

Following in the second round were J. G. Collins, Kennedy, J. G. Collins, 72; Pass, 74.

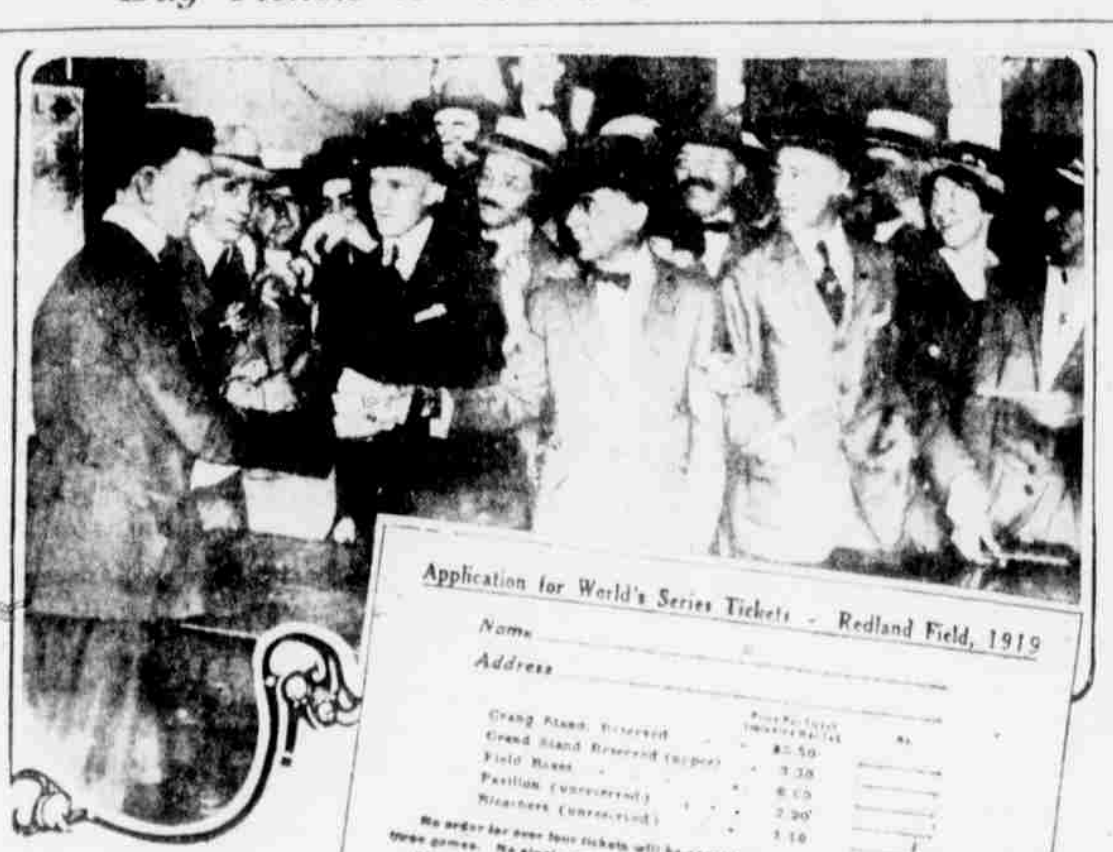
ON THE GRIDIRON

THE WESTERN league is not the only professional baseball circuit that may make a change of presidents. Big "Doc" Johnson is to lead with the assistance of the American league in its bid to take over the league. Johnson's bid is supported by the American league and the National league.

James E. Dickey, the new coach, is known as the greatest all-around athlete ever produced at the University of Missouri, especially in football. He was an All-American Varsity selection since leaving M. U. in 1912. He has coached the Multnomah Athletic club, Portland, Ore., where his team won the Pacific coast championship in 1912 at Astoria, Wash., and the state title at Camp Funston, Kan., and later at Camp Pike, Kan., handling altogether more than 100,000 men.
