

SCOTT FERRIS SEES VICTORY FOR LEAGUE

Candidate for Senate Predicts Ratification of World Covenant by United States.

CITY CLUB HEARS SPEECH

Forty-Six Nations Have Already Accepted Treaty Says Opponent of Gore in Address.

That the league of nations and the Versailles treaty will pass the senate and be a mildly revised treaty which would not be the hope expressed yesterday by Congressman Scott Ferris, candidate for democratic nomination in the United States senate. Mr. Ferris was in Tulsa as guest of honor and principal speaker at the meeting and luncheon of the City Club.

Forty-six nations have already ratified the treaty and declared it good enough for them, said the congressman. "I think it will pass congress without undergoing much change."

United for the league without reservations. The covenant is entirely satisfactory to me as it stands. Its strong points are the provisions for negotiation, reduction of international armaments, abolishment of secret treaties and the right to withdraw within two years. I don't believe any of the radical amendments will be incorporated in the body of the covenant."

Congressman Ferris came to Tulsa from Oklahoma City upon special invitation of A. C. Hunt and Horace Johnson. He was in the capital to hear President Wilson, but came to Oklahoma with the state congressional party to pay final respects to the body of Joseph Thompson, recently deceased Oklahoma representative.

Mr. Ferris was conducted on an automobile tour of the city Saturday morning and received visitors on the upper floor of Hotel Tulsa in the afternoon. He left for Muskogee last night and will return to Washington early this week.

U. S. COIN WORTH 3 PER CENT TO CANADA

Northern Dominion Pays That Much Premium for Good American Iron Men, Says Report.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 27.—Official estimates, just made public, show that Canada's present expenditure, exclusive of pensions, totals about \$389,000 a day. The dominion debt has mounted to more than \$3,000,000,000.

Total war expense for August was \$4,067,000 a reduction of about \$1,000,000 over August, of 1918. Since the end of March, the beginning of the fiscal year, capital expenditures for war purposes has totaled \$127,487,129, almost double what it was for the same period last year.

Revenue receipts have increased notably this summer. Current receipts for August was \$27,744,000, compared with \$26,933,000 for the previous August.

Depreciation of the value of Canadian currency is receiving constant attention from treasury officials. It has been pointed out that the condition probably cannot be remedied until part of the heavy trade balance against Canada in the latter half of the year has been paid in bullion or American currency and for some time Canadian banks have been buying American currency with Canadian currency, paying an average premium of 2 per cent.

ENGLISH MINERS SORRY AT RESULTS OF STRIKE

LEEDS, Eng., Sept. 29.—Some of the Yorkshire miners who went on strike in the great coal field there when they heard the price of coal was to be raised to protest against the government award for piece work seem hardly satisfied with the result in view of the fact that two months will be required to restore some of the mines to operation.

The Yorkshire Post quotes one of the miners as saying: "Every grown up man like me quarreling about the price of a packet of cigars more or less a week. 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ELECTRICITY MIGHT END SERVANT QUEST

Big Electrical Trades Exposition at Chicago Will Be Replete With Anti-Labor Schemes.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—New ways in which electricity can help the housewife, latest improvements on the old style will be shown at the electrical trades exposition at the McCormick building, 11-25, from September 28 to October 11-25. Household labor-saving machinery operated by electricity is coming rapidly into vogue, according to the exposition managers, and electricity is doing much to solve the great servant problem. The displays will include cooking apparatus of all kinds, electric clothes wringer, electric vacuum cleaners, refrigerating machines, motors for sewing machines, electrically operated machines for washing and ironing, and electric fans for cooling and ventilating.

Other exhibits will illustrate the development of things electrical during the war, and partly as a result of the war. There will be high power search lights, wireless telegraphs, wireless and self-writing telegraph apparatus. An electrical farm such as is used for making the high grade steel required for long range cannon will be on display and in adjacent lights will be manufactured before the eyes of visitors.

The elaborate decorative scheme for the exposition calls for an expenditure of between \$40,000 and \$50,000, according to E. W. Lloyd, manager. A Chinese design will be employed throughout the grounds. The building will be a model of the best and decorated with stained glass and 18,000 "Navagrah" jewels and Chinese lanterns. All brilliantly illuminated, being planned. The decorations of the tower will be similar to those of the "Tower of Jewels" at the Pan-American exposition at San Francisco.

PEOPLE'S FORUM

Editor, World: The position of President Wilson is pathetic indeed. I feel a nervous apprehension which none regret more than the opponents of the league for which he was making a courageous, if lonely battle. There is no doubt, either, in my opinion, in his party, who would be called on to take his place and finish his tour.

His personal location has been evident ever since he was elected. It became more pronounced when after his return from Paris, the country learned that even his own hand picked conferees had taken no active part in the deliberations at Paris, and that Mr. Wilson, alone and his wife, Mr. House, spoke and acted for America.

Now his breakdown phases the isolation still more and undoubtedly proves that the great democratic party has no personality outside Woodrow Wilson. In fact, it was in the presentation to the people of his pet project, which he has made a party issue, and upon which he insists the fate of his country depends, that he has begun to continue the work. And not only there an unfilled vacancy as far as the rest of his tour is concerned, but the assembly in which he has been elected to be dissolved because there was nobody there who could protect the president's side of the league of nations question. Ethical indeed is the isolation of the president. The democratic party has been reduced to one man because that man broke to other leadership than his own.
