

WOODS QUILTS ARMY'S EMPLOYMENT SERVICE

Man Who Reduced Unemployed Number from \$10,000,000 to 250,000 Teachers' Registration.

AVERS SITUATION NORMAL

Chief of Department Commented by Secretary Baker on Work in Helping Soldiers.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—(Special) Arthur Woods, assistant to the secretary of war, has handed his resignation to Mr. Baker. It has been accepted with congratulations on the work done by Colonel Woods during his incumbency. Since March, 1918, he has been in charge of securing employment for honorably discharged service men.

This service will now be made a permanent one. Heretofore it has been dropped the soldier at the moment of his separation from the service, but Colonel Woods' recommendation to Secretary Baker that the soldier be helped back to a normal life is to be made a permanent feature.

Major General William H. Haan, director of the war plan division, assistant chief of staff, will take over the duties of the secretary of war. Major General M. C. Smith will be executive in charge.

Secretary Baker means to fit in to this office with a new plan for the army, by which it is proposed not only to train the recruit but to give him an education. This plan has three purposes. First, to make the man a soldier; second, to give him an education in order that he may become a better soldier; third, to find for the former soldier, after he has been discharged, the extra education he has had.

When Colonel Woods took office six months ago, there were practically 10,000,000 men to be provided with equipment. Today from the best figures obtainable by the war camp community service and the United States engineering corps, there are between 20,000 and 30,000 men discharged from the army still out of work. About 80 per cent of the returned fighting men have been cared for by their former employers, leaving 20 per cent for whom jobs had to be found or created. There are left out of work now only the number normally—the labor turnover.

In saying goodbye to Secretary Baker and his own personal staff, Colonel Woods said that he had no definite plans for the future farther than that he expected to make his home in New York city, where he was police commissioner during the administration of the late Mayor Mitchell. In referring to his work, he said:

"We found the job too big for any one organization, right from the beginning, but all sorts of warfare bodies joined in cheerfully and enthusiastically and the country itself accepted the situation loyally. That has done it. Unemployment is now normal.

"Shortly after my own discharge from the army, Secretary Baker called me up on the long distance telephone at the place where I was in the south and asked me to come back to help in the emergency caused by the difficulty of getting discharged soldiers readjusted to civil life. In this work I have had the consistently cordial support of the secretary in every possible way, and the extraordinary experience of never calling upon any organization or individual without getting a favorable response.

"Every one has seemed to hold it a privilege to take into civil life the men who have fought to defend the country. During the past few weeks the emergency that called me to this work has disappeared and the number out of employment is steadily decreasing until now it is no greater than it would be by reason of the natural turnover of labor in everyday life.

"It is especially gratifying to me that this work, which was entirely new when I started it under Secretary Baker, will continue in such a favorable hands as General Haan's. This means that the army itself intends to do what it can to promote the welfare of not only the soldiers themselves but that in all men who are graduates of army institutions."

EFFECT ON THE DRINKER TO BE INTOXICANT TEST

SAN JUAN, P. R., Sept. 27.—The final test regarding the sale of alcoholic drinks in Porto Rico will be as to their intoxicating quality and not as to the percentage of alcohol contained, according to a decision just handed down by Judge Hamilton in the federal court here.

The decision was in the case brought by the United States district attorney against the Porto Rico Brewing company for the sale of a quantity of beer admitted to contain 2 1/2 per cent alcohol as authorized by the legislature following the prohibition vote in 1918.

Judge Hamilton ruled that the district attorney must prove that the drink is intoxicating. Many tests of the beer are reported to have been made by local authorities to ascertain whether it is intoxicating.

Shah to Travel Light. LONDON, Sept. 27.—An announcement that the Shah of Persia is on his way to visit London through the kindness of the newspapers that the government would accept of him an enthusiastic welcome and all the pomp and pageantry of the visit of that other Shah in Victorian days would be repeated. At this time of his visit he is said to be planning to take his tastes and manner of dress to follow the tastes of his hosts. This was accompanied by a brilliant staff of more than 200 persons.

Ancient Sundial Destroyed. LONDON, Sept. 27.—A sundial known as "The Queen's Sundial," which for years has been in position on the terrace at Ludlow House, Highgate, was broken beyond repair while workmen were trying to change its position today. There is still in the house the original sundial, which is much older than the sundial and was placed there when she was installed in the place by Charles II.
