At 11:30 o'clock today an unknown negro shot and almost instantly killed J. W. Williams, a street car conductor, at Fourth street and Phillips avenue, the weapon used being a 32 caliber revolver. The dead conductor lived at 320 West Main street and is survived by his wife and a small child.
