

GOVERNOR FLAYS MISSOURI SOLON

Robertson Says Senator Read Got What Was Coming to Him.

ARRESTS ARE EXPECTED

Local Authorities Say 10 Egg-Throwers Will Be Jailed.

MEMPHIS, Oct. 2.—Arrest of at least 10 men who last night threw eggs at United States Senator James M. Robertson when he stopped at Memphis here in opposition to President Wilson's league of nations treaty, was announced today by local authorities. During the night a shot was fired but authorities say they are convinced that the shot was fired into the air and that an attempt had been made to shoot the senator.

Senator Read was scheduled to speak in Convention hall and had been introduced by Mayor William Freeman, who explained that he was doing his duty in introducing Senator Read, regardless of their difference in views on the league to be discussed. As senator Read took the platform someone on the ground threw a brick which hit the speaker's platform. When order had been restored the senator made an unsuccessful attempt to continue his speech but was hurried down by the audience and when he returned to his hotel where he remained until midnight when he took a train for the west.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 2.—Governor Robertson, when asked whether or not he would order an investigation of the Ardmore affair, said: "I have received no request from any official for an investigation of the alleged disturbance that occurred at Ardmore last night. The people of Carter county are certain of their ability to take care of a small matter of that kind themselves. It is unfortunate, of course, that any more respectable men who hold the official position of United States senator should be denied the right of free speech. Yet the right of free speech must not degenerate into license nor authorize anyone to vilify and gratuitously insult the president of the United States. This is exceptionally true in Oklahoma which should be 100 per cent loyal and patriotic. Had it been an I. W. W. man traveling over the state insulting not only the president but all others who differed from him, every republican in the state and all other good citizens would loudly applaud such action as I was told was taken at Ardmore."

Neither senator Read nor any other person can come to Oklahoma and unfairly criticize and insult the president with impunity and from

what I can gather from reports of his Missouri and Oklahoma City speeches he got just what was coming to him at Ardmore.

"What pains me more than anything else in this connection is that certain misguided citizens in the state are willing to give him and others of his ilk and comfort and an air of respectability by attending his meetings and defending his actions."

Oklahoma City Man Killed at Ponca City in Gasoline Explosion

PONCA CITY, Okla., Oct. 2.—V. T. Hazebreg of Oklahoma City was killed at 4 o'clock this afternoon at the chemical laboratory of the Marland Refining company, when a tank filled with gas exploded. A fragment struck Hazebreg on the right shoulder, tearing off his arm, and he died in three minutes. Three other employees were overcome with gas, narrowly escaping death. Hazebreg was working the day shift at the time of the explosion. He was a graduate of the Marland company and had been working on experiments with gasoline and crude oil which he believed would be of great value to oil producers. The Marland firm had loaned him the laboratory for his experiments.
