

# Quiet on the Coal Front and Deep Monotony Prevails

### Guardsmen and Comrades in Third Regiment Merely "Waiting."

### MINERS ACT CHUMMY With the Soldiers to Picnic and Challenge Them to Football Game.

(By PAUL HEDRICK) Staff Correspondent. HENRYETTA, Nov. 8.—"There is a quiet on the coal front. There have been no casualties. The morale of the men is good. Few have been encountered to date."

The principal cause of the monotony is the lack of an enemy. The guards do not seem to be in a belligerent mood. On the contrary they show a disposition to frolic with the soldiers whom Governor Weston ordered out to keep order among the striking miners. The miners held a big barbecue Saturday and extended an invitation to the "whole army" to come, but the commanding officer declined to accept the hospitality of the "enemy."

However, the pick welders have organized several football teams and are held at practice for games with the militia men. One game has already been played and the strikers won. The militia men are playing the only "battle" of the war. The guards from loneliness some at home and the difficulty some have with gas, there is not a great deal of cause for complaint. All the men are heated with gas and it saves a great deal of fuel. "I am chronologically speaking," said one of the 1000 officers and men of the 3rd Regiment, commanded by Col. Miles E. McPherson of Durant, "I placed strategically in the event of an attack or outbreak, the guardsmen could quickly take steps to put down the trouble. No trouble is expected," said Col. McPherson, "but we are prepared for emergencies. The miners strike, are as far as we can ascertain staying at their homes, keeping off of the mine property. The other communities have acted very friendly to the guard, and trust that nothing will happen to the friendly relations established."

The quiet is depressing. The quiet and orderly have the guardsmen found things in this that many are beginning to wonder when they will be ordered to again. All kinds of rumors are being spread, but the apparent indifference of the part of the miners makes it impossible to forecast what will happen, or how long the regiment will remain to guard the properties. It is generally believed by the guardsmen that when volunteers be-

we have to eat Thanksgiving or Christmas dinner down here. "Lordy, but this is a quiet place to shut up 1,000 red blooded men in." Almost to a man, the guardsmen believe that they will have to stay in the coal field part, if not all winter. They say that most of the striking miners have either a "nest egg" laid away, or have been able to stock up their jarders. The class of miners who have gardens, some chickens, a few pigs and a cow, however, are sadly in the minority. It seems that most of the miners consider such tasks menial and beneath their dignity, and as most of them have large families, the housewife is too busy to look after such things.

Merchants of Henryetta say that the miners in the Henryetta field were among the best paid in the nation, and that their little shacks in the hills, valleys and isolated places, are all well furnished. As an evidence of their good citizenship, the miners have elected the following statement:

### Miners Declare Loyalty.

HENRYETTA, Nov. 8.—Inasmuch as the governor of the state of Oklahoma has sent the national guard into the various coal mining centers of Oklahoma to serve peace in connection with the coal strike, which went into effect October 31, we, the undersigned committee, have been authorized to issue the following statement in behalf of the miners of Henryetta and Okmulgee county.

There should be no question as to the loyalty of the miners to their country, which has been fully demonstrated, and acknowledged; and there is absolutely no reason why the miners of this, or any other section of the country, should be portrayed to the public as a law-violating element, merely because they have exercised their constitutional right to strike. We want to assure the citizens

of Henryetta and Okmulgee county, as well as the public that we have the highest regard for the law in every respect, and that we are anxious to cooperate with the city and county officials to the furthest extent in carrying the law into effect should it be necessary. We further want to as-

sure the public at large that under no circumstance will the law violation of any character be countenanced by the miners and we are

not a law-violating element, merely because they have exercised their constitutional right to strike. We want to assure the citizens
