

SIX TRACTS BRING \$100,000 AT SALE

Cable E. Parker Disappointed at Failure of Bidders to Seek Asphalt Lands.

Special to The World. OKLAHOMA, Nov. 13.—A little more than \$100,000 worth of segregated coal tracts, asphalt and other lands in the first and second day of the sale of the state of Oklahoma. The sale disposes of the asphalt tracts, superintendent of the sale, explained that the five asphalt tracts for the next sale were held in six months ago. The asphalt tracts will be sold to the highest bidder instead of appraised value as in the case of the coal tracts.

MINERS GET ORDER ANNULLING STRIKE

Operators Believe That Men Will Return to Work Friday Morning in State.

Special to The World. M'ALESTER, Nov. 13.—The strike local order was received late today by local mine union officials. All the preparations have been made in advance by the operators for the men to resume work tomorrow morning and it is expected that the return to the jobs will be practically unattended.

General Barrett in command of the Oklahoma national guard, ordered his troops to withdraw from all mine properties near here today. The movement has started and will be completed tomorrow morning. Convict workers were taken out of the mines at noon except at the joint-ventured mine which remains to repair damage of a slight accident.

Six units of the guard, the only ones remaining in the coal field are ordered to assemble at their camp in an amusement park in this city. General Barrett expects to be sending these men home very soon. They are companies D and E, second regiment, machine gun company, supply company and H and I companies of the first separate battalion.

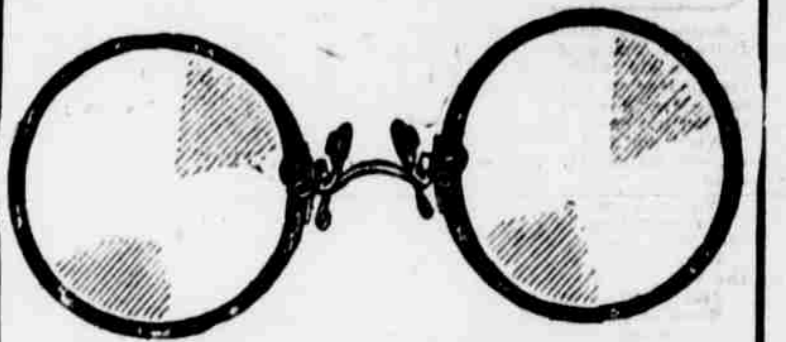
