Tried of Flight Between Capital and Labor Halt Million Consumers Declare "Milk Strike."

New York, Nov. 16.—More than 10,000 consumers in greater New York tomorrow are expected to go on a "milk strike."

No reduction in price is expected to result from the boycott, which is being directed by the parent organization of the community councils of national defense.

"Our main object, of course, is to organize the consumers and prepare to take collective action to protect their own interests," declared a leader of the movement.

Brought Not to Interfere

Arkansas Governor Thinks Negroes Deserve Electrocution.

LITTLE ROCK, Nov. 16.—Declaring that the governor's office would not be swayed by outside influences in regard to the death sentences passed upon 11 negroes for participation in the recent Phillips county race rebellion, Governor Brough today decided to ignore the telegram from M. W. Trotter, secretary of the national equal rights league requesting executive interference in the case.
