

GORE SAYS VOICE OF PEOPLE RIGHT

What the President Says Says Does Not Affect Blind Senator.

Rubber stamp statesmanship has no place in the creed of Senator Thomas Gore, according to the sentiments expressed by the gray-haired senator in an interview with a World reporter during his visit to Tulsa yesterday.

Not only did he place the blame for the treaty deadlock in the senate on the uncompromising attitude of the "rubber stamps," but he also intimated that if the members of the democratic party listened to the dictates from the white house rather than their own ears to the wishes of the people and attempted to make the rubber stamp the emblem of the statesmanship of the party in the coming campaign that they would invite disaster and defeat.

"It is a characteristic of the American people that regardless of what party they favor they always admire a man who is firm in his convictions and has the courage to fight

for them when it becomes necessary. Discussing the action of the senate on the peace treaty and the league of nations, the senator declared that he believed that both sides were ready to compromise and ratify the treaty until the letter of the president was announced.

"That crystallized the minds of the senate along party lines. The republicans became indignant and stood firmly for the reservations, while the democrats obeyed the order and voted against the treaty. What the future action on the matter will be I do not attempt to predict."
