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DENIES RAILROAD STRIKE PLANNED

Chief of Trainmen Refutes Rumor Coming From Chicago.

LOCALS FOR WALKOUT

Admission Made That Several Bringing Pressure for General Tieup.

ACCEPT ONE HINES OFFER

Cleveland Conference Approves "Away From Home" Rule—To Reject O. T.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—Reports that national leaders of the four railway brotherhoods in session at Cleveland are holding secret discussions as to whether a strike of railway workers in the United States should be called by December 1, and which gained wide circulation and considerable credence in Chicago railway union circles, were denied tonight by W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, and by Timothy Shea, acting president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. President Lee, however, admitted having received a telegram from the Kansas City local saying that the trainmen and yardmen there had decided to strike tomorrow and that he had warned them that if they thought they were "bigger" than the United States government, he had no advice to give them.

KANSAS CITY HAS NO WORD OF STRIKE

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 25.—Information obtained here tonight was that the local trainmen's union had decided to wait the action of the Cleveland convention before striking. It was intimated that in the event a national railroad strike is called, the walkout would begin in Kansas City and spread to other railroad centers.

ACCEPT ONE OFFER MADE BY HINES

CLEVELAND, Nov. 25.—The 500 general chairman of the four great railroad brotherhoods called in conference here by the four executives to consider the offer of Director General of Railroads Hines granting time and one-half for overtime in slow freight service, provided arbitrary allowances now given in many of the schedules in effect, which double or more payment for the same hours, are eliminated.

REPORT ANGELES IS FOUND GUILTY

Juarez Hears of Verdict Against Villa's Leader.

EXECUTION IS SET OFF

Writ of Habeas Corpus Asked of Higher Court—May Appeal to Carranza.

JAUREZ, Mexico, Nov. 25.—General Felipe Angeles and his two companions, Major Pascual de Arce and Soldier Antonio Trillo, captured near Parral, Chihuahua, November 15, by Major Gabino Sandival, were found guilty by a court martial at Chihuahua City this morning and sentenced to be shot at noon today, according to information received by Judge Gonzalez Medina of the Mexican federal court here this afternoon. The sentence was not carried out, it was said, because the attorneys for Angeles appealed to the federal court at Juarez and the supreme court of Mexico at Mexico City, for a stay of execution, by applying for a writ of habeas corpus.

While Playing a Game With Mother Is Shot and Killed

While he was playing rook with his mother at 9 o'clock last night, Walker Turner, 14, son of S. G. Turner, 535 South Trenton, and ninth grade student at Washington school, was shot and almost instantly killed when a brother, El Claud, 18, accidentally discharged a .45 Colt automatic revolver. The tragedy blighted a family reunion. Last night for the first time in three years, the Turner family, six children and father and mother were all together. Walker was playing rook with his mother and the father and Claud had just finished playing a game. "Grandpa is giving this gun to grandpa when I visit him in Arkansas next spring," said Claud as he fondled the revolver which he had bought only three days ago. "Grandpa thought I was a big gun and I think this will just suit him."

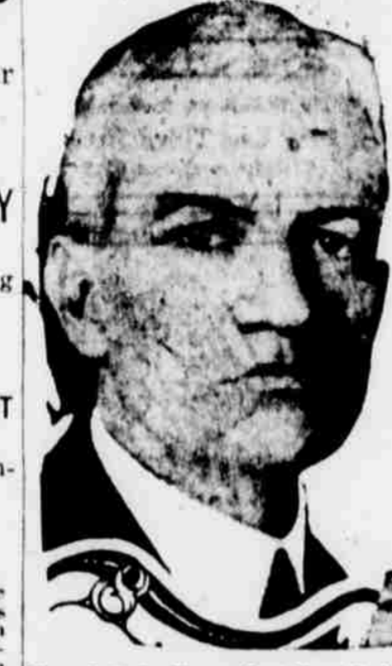
